THE YORKSHIRE ASSOCIATION.
The Annual Meeting of the above Association was held at Brighouse on Saturday, January 23rd. This annual meeting is always welcome to our Yorkshire friends, as the official report is then presented to them. An item of great interest this year is their record number of new nembers, and as the Society has no probationers, it follows that this record is the more encouraging. To quote from the report, the Committee point out that they are able to call attention to the great increase of new members. "In the first year of the Society sixty-five ringing members entered their names with us, and this remained our record for ten years, viz., until 1885. In that year our recruits went up to seventy-nine, and three years later that figure was beaten by one, so that our record stood in 1888 at 80 . This by no means insignificant number has since held its own until this year, when it has been beaten by the magnificent number of ninety-two new enrolments. But this is not all. In addition to these ninety-two ringing members we have added to our list of patrons the Ven. Archdeacon Brooke, of Halifax, whose sermon of last year at our annual meeting will long be remembered, and also our kind friend Canon Nolloth, of Beverley Minster, who has joined us as an hon. member." A band started for a peal at Brighouse parish church in good time in the morning, but after some half hour's ringing the bells had to be stopped on account of very serious illness near the church. This untoward event is we believe the first that has happened at a meeting during the twenty-eight years' experience of the Society. The disappointed band however moved to Lightcliffe parish church, where the peal, already recorded in our columns, was successfully brought round under the conductorship of Mr. Charles Jackson, of Hull. This, as the day wore on, proved to be the only important ringing, as the Brig. house bells had to continue their silence. Meanwhile the auditors, Messrs. David Brearley and Thos. McKegg, were busy at headquarters, the schools being kindly lent by the church authorities for the day. The accumulated funds now amount to $£ 250$, and this would appear to an outsider to be "riches beyond the dreams of avarice." But when the Treasurer, Mr. Stainthorpe, of Birstall, owns to the honour of having 613 members who are free from all subscription for life, the actual state of affairs is greatly altered, and is pronounced by the experts to be satisfactory and no more. The full number of members is II8I, made up of seven patrons, thirty-seven honorary, and 1137 performing members. Hence more than half the Society are non-contributing, relying on the annual interest of the funds. The problem of life membership after a ten years' payment (amounting in all to ris. 6d.) is an interesting one, and our Yorkshire friends say that with careful management they are just holding their own. Peals to
the number of sixty-seven have been rung during the year, distributed over forty-six different churches, and this distribution is again a record. Two are of Yorkshire Surprise Major-a new method by Mr. Arthur Craven, of Leeds and Chesterfield, secured by a well-chosen band, which included a clergyman.

There was a good attendance at the annual service at 4.0 p.m., when the sermon was preached by the Vicar ${ }^{\text {s }}$ the Rev. O. S. Laurie, from the text-" In that day there shall be upon the bells . . . Holiness to the Lord," Zechariah xiv. 20. In a friendly and sympathetic discourse after referring to the born love of bells which seemed to animate the nation, the preacher referred to the genuine pleasure given to those who had long resided abroad on returning to their native land and hearing the bells ring in the true English fashion; little wonder then that their rhymic music opened up the echoes of the past. For all this they had to thank the ringers. Yes, indeed, to be a good change-ringer was an honour and a privilege, and he was one (f those with a strong hope that the work now being done by the various Associations was rousing the individual members to more fully consider and realise their responsibilities as good sons of the Church. He was pleased to hear of the continued success of their County Association, and of those who gave up so much of their time to such a splendid piece of work. He knew from his experience as a clergyman what a help it was for a man to be able to say to himself in the hour of temptation, "this won't do for me, I am a churchman," the very recollection of his joint responsibility tending at once to pull him up in his downward career. So let it be with all, ringers included, set up a high standard, and seek to live up to it, glorying in your work and Art both as ringers and churchmen. During the address the Vicar made sympathetic reference to the very serious case of illnesslife and death being evenly in the balance-and expressed great sympathy with those present who had naturally been looking forward to a hearty ring.

Tea followed in the schools, some 200 sitting down, after which the business meeting was commenced, with the President in the chair, supported by the Vicar, Mr. Churchwarden Wood, and the leading officers of the Association. The minutes of the previous meeting (Doncaster), having been read and passed, the President paid a well-deserved compliment to the members then present on the patient way in which they had met the disappointment arising out of the enforced silence of the bells, adding that he had never felt more proud of the Association than under the restraint under which they had to place themselves.

On the motion of Mr. David Brearley (Bolsterstone), seconded by Mr. McKegg (Wortley), Hon. Auditors, the report of the Committee was accepted, and the Treasurer's balance-sheet was passed.

The President then declared the following officers reelected without opposition: Mr. W. H. Howard (VicePresident; Mr. Thomas Hattersley (Steward) ; Mr. W. Stainthorpe (Hon. Treasurer); and Messrs. Cottrill, Abbishaw, Pearson, and Joseph Radcliffe (Saddleworth), Committee-men. In this matter the President referred to the pleasure they all had in seeing their re-elected veteran Vice-Presfdent among them, and also expressed the Association's great approbation of the constancy with which their Hon. Treasurer held his post.

Mr. McKegg proposed Wortley as the place of next meeting, and this was seconded by Mr. D. Brearley. As an amendment Mr, G. H. Wilson (Drighlington), pro-
posed that place, and this was seconded by Mr. J. B. Lamb (Haliax). The voting went in favour of Drighlington, the chairman voicing the meeting's appreciation of the kindness of their Wortley friends in putting forward their invitation notwithstanding the other choice made.

On the motion of Mr. Rew (Sheffield), seconded by Mr. Schofield (Lindley), a vote of thanks was passed to the auditors and the officers for their year's work.

On the motion from the chair, seconded by Mr. Howard, a vote of thanks was passed to the Vicar for his sermon and the use of the schools, and also to Mr. Pearson, the organist, for accompanying the service.

The Vicar, in replying, hoped that on some other occasion the disappointment of that day would be atoned.

Mr. Churchwarden Wood added a few kindly words, in which he stated the wish of their church to befriend the ringers in every way possible.

The roll-call of the officers showed twelve out of a possible total of nineteen, and this, when the size of the county is considered, proved a very fair muster.

The President moved the following alteration of rule, which being seconded by the Hon. Secretary, Mr. Holgate, is ready for voting upon at the next meeting-"As soon as convenient after the May Meeting (the old rule here read September) a notice will be sent to each member whose subscription is unpaid, members thus, notified will not be entitled to receive'the annual report."

The President explained that the intention of the alteration was to save time by bringing the dilatory members to book at an earlier period, and so expedite the official work.

On the motion of Mr. George Bolland, vice-president, a hearty vote of thanks was passed to the Brighouse brancb, and to the ladies for presiding at the tea tables, to which Mr. Drake, local hon. secretary, suitably replied. A vote of thanks to the chairman, moved by Mr. Holgate, and seconded by Mr. Lawson, brought the meeting to a close.

## MENDLESHAM, SUFFOLK.

The ringers of this parish church held their annual festival on New Year's Day. Ringing commenced shortly after II o'clock with a quarter-peal of Grandsire Doubles. Ringing over a move was made to The Royal Oak, where dinner was provided, the Rev. E. F. Randolph taking the chair. Justice having been done to the good things provided, the Chairman proposed "The Health of the King, Queen, and all the Royal Family," which was duly responded to. Six o'clock brought on tea time, after which the evening was spent in handbell ringing, songs and games, thus ending a most enjoyable day.

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## DURHAM AND NEWCASTLE DIOCESAN ASSOCIATION.

The pre-Lent meeting was held in Chester-le-Street on Saturday, February I3th, and was attended by members from Sunderland, Shildon, Darlington, Newcastle, Cramlington, Gateshead, Gosforth, North Shields, Stockton, Whitley, and the home branch. By kind permission of the Rector tea was held in the Church Institute and was followed by a short meeting in the same room, at which votes of thanks were passed to the Rector and churchwardens for the use of the bells and of the vestry for committee work, and of the Institute for tea. ## THE DEVONSHIRE GUILD.

The Three Towns branch of the above Guild paid a visit to Plympton on a recent Saturday in connection with the renovation of St. Maurice church bells. In 3 hrs. 8 mins. Holt's ten-part peal of Grandsire Triples was rung, conducted by Mr. E. W. Marsh. The bells bears the dates of $1735,1768,1833$, and 1895 respectively, and the tenor which weighs 15 cwt., bears the inscrip-tion:-" Both day and night I measure time for all; to mirth, to grief, to church I call." The family of the late Colonel Henry Buller placed the treble and 2nd in the tower nine years ago. They weigh respectively 5 cwt. and $5 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{cwt}$., and bear the following inscription: "To the glory of God, and in memory of Colonel H. M. Buller, Commandant Central India Horse; died at Simla, October 3rd, 1892; erected by his wife, brother and sisters."

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## ARCHDEACONRY OF STAFFORD SOCIETY.

A quarterly meeting was held at St. Paul's, Wood Green on Saturday, January 16th. Notwithstanding the severe and wintry weather, the splendid number of fiftythree ringers attended. Ringing took place in St. Paul's tower ( 8 bells), and the parish church (io bells), and Darlaston parish church ( 8 bells), some excellent ringing being done in each tower. Many and sincere were the good wishes which follow the former Secretary in his new sphere of work.

The Rev. J. W. Wilkes, Vicar of Wednesbury, has undertaken the work until June 24 th, the end of the Association year.

An excellent tea was partaken of in the schools at the close of the meeting. Good appetites quickly attacked the many good things provided by Mrs. H. Elwell and her lady friends.

A vote of thanks was passed to the Vicar for the use of the church and tower, and his sermon, and to the ladies for providing the tea, and the Vicar in responding said that he would be glad to become an honorary member. Then the ringers went back to the various towers, and beautitul bell music filled the air, and a very pleasant and enjoyable meeting closed.

## DISS, NORFOLK.

The seventy-first anniversary of St. Mary's church bells was held on January 6th (Old Christmas Day), when some musical touches of Double Norwich, Oxford Treble Bob and Stedman Triples were rung in fine style. Manning), and his curates (Revs. -. Mahon and Evans), the churchwardens and six of the leading tradesmen of the town. After the cloth was removed the vsual loyal toasts were given and duly honoured. The healths of the Rector, churchwardens, chairmen and subscribers concluded the best meeting that the society has ever held.

## WIL LIAM BURKIN.

It is with deep regret that I report the death of William Burkin, of Natfield, Surrey, which sad event took place on February 13th at his residence after a trying illness. The deceased, who was only 42 years of age, had long been connected with Nutfield parish church as a member both of belfry and choir, and of late years held the office of verger. His demise is all the more sad on account of his only recent settlement down to married life, and much sympathy is felt therefore for the young widow and little child. As a token of respect the bells were rung muffled on the Sunday. The fnneral took place on the following Thursday, amid many manifestations of regret. The portion of the service performed in the church was fully choral, the choir singing the beautiful hymns, "Brief life is here our portion," and "On the Resurrection Morning," and Psalm xc. in a most impressive manner, and as the cortege left the church the organist played the Dead March. Besides the principal mourners most of the villagers joined the sad procession to the cemetery, where the service of committal was read by the Rector (Rev. C. Hartwell Jones). Many wreaths were sent, among which was a beautiful floral bell from the Nutfield company, also from the Reigate society and Nutfield church choir, and many others. The deceased was a native of Nutfield, where he learned the art on the ring of six at his native village, but later years saw him in London, where he bacame a prominent member of the College Youths, and held the post of Master of that society for two years in succession. He was a member of the Surrey and Sussex Associations, and an hon. member of the Reigate society. He had taken part in nearly 100 peals, on all numbers of bells, and in nearly all methods. May he rest in peace.
The bells of Nutfield parish church were rung muffled in the evening, and at Reigate a peal of Grandsire Caters was rung muffled as a token of respect.

## CHARLES DEMPSEY.

With feelings of regret is recorded the death of this ringer, which took place on February 16th last, aged 6x. He was not so well known in the ringing world as some, although in his young days he learnt to handle a bell at the church of his native parish-Spitalfields; but in those days young men were not so much thought of in the Exercise as now, hence he gave up all connection with it until some few years ago, when he came to reside at West Ham, Essex. After ringing the tenor to a peal of Grandsire Triples he made up his mind to master the treble, which he succeeded in doing, on account of advancing years never progressing any further. He rang several peals of Triples and Major. He was a member of the Essex Association and the West Ham local company, and with the latter rang the treble to a peal of Grandsire Caters, which is recorded in the tower of All Saints, West Ham.
The funeral took place at West Ham cemetery on February 23 rd, the ringers representing the above societies at the graveside being S. Hayes, W. Doran, and F. Searle. Muffled peals were rung in the evening: that at Bow in connection with the College Youths and Bow societies being the usual whole pull and stand, followed by a touch of Stedman Triples by S. Hayes, S. Bird, R. Turner, Y. Green, E. Hall, J. Jones, A. Peck, and H. Torble; that at West Ham in connection with the Essex Asso. ciation and the local company being also the usual whole pull and stand, followed by a touch of Grandsire Caters by W. Doran, J. Bradley, W. Keeble, J. Moule, R. Searle, G. Potter, F. Searle, E. Clayton, G. Pearl, and G. Hayden.

## EDWARD WATKINS.

The sudden death of the above-named ringer, which took place in the early hours of Sunday morning, February 14th, at Temple Street, High Wycombe, at the age of 68 , i2 very mach regretted. He had occasionally received medical attention of late, but feeling so much better on the day previous, and beiug
a lover of sport, he witnessed a local football match. On retiring to rest in ine evening nothing unusual was noticed with him, but in the early hours of the following morning the household was suddenly awakened to the fact that he was in a serious condition, and before medical aid could be procured be passed away, death being due to syncope. Deceased had been connected with High Wycombe belfry between 50 and 60 years. when change-ringing took a firm hold there some five years ago, by the amalgamation of the then voluntary society with the old band, be was one of the few round ringers who continued their connection with the belfry, although at his age it could not be expected of him to master the art of change, yet be was a regular attendant on Sundays and practice nighte, and was ever willing to take a rope when short-handed. The last occasion on which he rung was on new year's morning, immediately after the midnigbt service.
On Monday evening, February 15th, and again on Wednes. day, the bells of the parish church were rung balf-muffed, and ou Thursday, the 18th instant his remains were laid to rest in High Wycombe cemetery, followed to the grave by children and grandchildren, ringers past and present, and members of the Foresters' Court of which order he had been a member for some 30 years. Among the many floral tributes was one from his brother-ringers, who in the evening rang touches of Grandsire with the bells fully muffled.

## J. W. LONG.

It is with heartfelt regret that we have to record the death of Mr. J. W. Long, of Thirsk, who died on February 19th, in his 28th year, after a long illness. He was a member of the Cleveland and North Yorkshire Association, having one peal to his credit. His remains were interred on Monday, February 22nd, in the Cemetery, Thirsk, being borne to their last resting-place by the ringers of the parish church, of which be was a riuger for many years. The tenor in this peal was rung by the same ringer who has just "turned-in" St. Paul's tenor in a peal of Treble-Twelve-Mr. H. R. Newton.
