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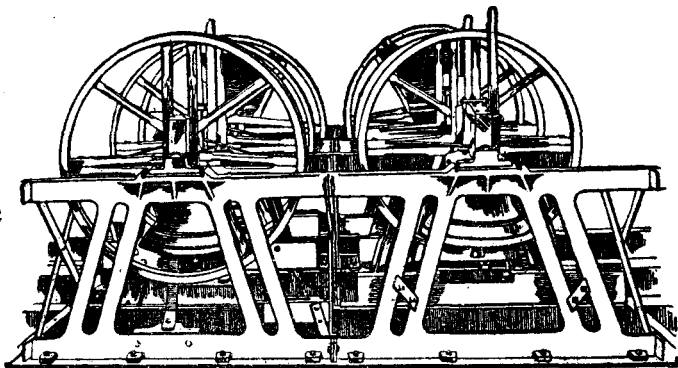

THE ESSEX ASSOCIATION.

The Annual Meeting of the South Eastern Division was held at Great Baddow on Saturday, December 3rd. The bells of St. Mary's were raised soon after 3 p.m., and kept merrily swinging till 5 p.m. the time appointed for the service. The Vicar, the Rev. A. N. Colley, officiated, assisted by the Rev. J. B. Plumbtree, of Danbury. The organist and choir boys were also in attendance. The short form of service as usually used by the Association was brought into use, the Rev. J. B. Plumbtree delivered an excellent address, and the singing was entered into freely. Tea was served at The King's Head by hostess Shorten, twenty-nine sitting down. Mr. C. H. Howard, Master of the Association, presided, supported by the Rev. H. T. Eyre, Hon. Secretary. After tea the business meeting was held. The minutes of the last meeting were passed, one new member elected, and both retiring officers unanimously re-elected. Prittlewell was selected as the next meeting place in March.

The Hon. Secretary proposed a hearty vote of thanks to the Rev. A. N. Colley for the use of his bells and the service he had given, all regretting he was unable to be present at the tea and meeting.

Mr. Howard seconded, and said he was very pleased to come to a meeting at Great Baddow as Master of the Association, he being a native of the parish, and learnt his first ringing there when quite a boy, carrying a small box to stand on each time he went to practice, and when later duty called him to Braintree there was quite a scramble amongst the ringers as to who should have the box. It was eventually secured by old Bill Newman, who boasts about it to this day. He was also most pleased to see Mr. Finch, the churchwarden, joining them, and hoped in the future those meetings would always boast of the attendance of the clergy and churchwardens.

Mr. Finch, responding, said he was sure it gave the Vicar much pleasure in welcoming the Association to Baddow that day, and regretted he was unable to attend the meeting. As for himself he was quite proud to be amongst so many ringers. He was a bellringer himself, but the bells he usually rang were door bells, thus annoying some people that way. He related a little history of the parish, including the meaning of the sign of the bell, indicating The Bell inn; also when in 1819 eight ringers, natives of Baddow, rang a peal of Bob Major, 10,080 changes, in 5 hrs. 40 mins. These men, on entering the churchyard afterwards were met by a large crowd of people, who congratulated them on their performance. His great uncle rang the 3rd. He thanked the members for the kind words that had been said of the Vicar and himself.

The tower was again visited and ringing kept up till 9 p.m., at which hour those who had journeyed from Boreham, Chelmsford, Galleywood, Widford, Maldon, Great Totham, Springfield, Writtle, etc., to make the days proceedings a success, had just one together, then a shake of the hand, and turned towards their respective homes, well satisfied the meeting at Baddow had been a success.

MR. JAMES ROBERT HAWORTH.

BORN APRIL 21ST, 1821. DIED DECEMBER 24TH, 1910.

For nearly seventy years Mr. Haworth has been one of the most prominent personages of the Exercise. During his apprenticeship of seven years he became acquainted with the ringers of that period, and has since been connected with the belfries of the most famous London churches.

Mr. Haworth was a member of several Provincial Associations to some of which he had been a successful instructor, and he was a most regular supporter of the practices of the St. James's and College Youths in London.

His election to the latter took place on August 13th, 1839, and on October 1st of the same year he rang his first peal—Grandsire Triples—at Holy Trinity, Southwark.

In his early peals he was contemporary with Antill, Lobb, Freeman, Tolladay, Goozee, Stockham, Britten, James Mash, Sawyer, Lansdell, Frost, Cox, Menday, Powell, Jameson, Cooter, W. Banister, S. Austin, Wood, Dwight, Nelms, Booth, Muskett, Haley, etc., three of whom are still living.

Some of the more notable performances in which Mr. Haworth took part were: 5088 Kent Treble Bob Maximus in 1846 at St. Saviour's, Southwark, being the first rung in London; 7524 Stedman Cinques at Cripplegate in 1851; 8580 Stedman Cinques at Cornhill in 1851; 5080 Stedman Caters at Bow, Cheapside, in 1863; the first peal in Ireland, Grandsire Triples, at Waterford in 1872; the first peal in Scotland, Grandsire Triples, at St. Mary's, Dundee, in 1873; 8099 Grandsire Caters at St. Clement Danes in 1878; 5014 Stedman Cinques at St. Paul's Cathedral in 1881, being the first on the bells, and he also rang in the first peal on the bells of Chichester Cathedral in 1885. His peals number altogether 176, the last one, Grandsire Caters, was rung at St. Clement Danes, in 1894, conducted by Mr. C. F. Winney.

Mr. Haworth held at different times engagements as Instructor at Dundee, Hanmer, Flintshire; St. Albans Abbey, Wanstead, Privett, Swavesey, Cambs.; and for several years he attended fortnightly at Waltham Abbey to assist the local ringers there.

During his long career he has helped at the openings of new rings in all parts of the British Isles, e.g. St. Stephen's, Carlisle, Leith, Bournemouth, Northwold, Waterford, Dundee, St. Stephen's, Hampstead, St. John's, Deptford, Weybridge, Llanstephan, Privett, Hants., Kingston, Dorset.

In 1883 the College Youths were the recipients from Mr. Haworth, of a silver cup weighing 15 ozs. and costing with the inscription of 141 words, the sum of £8 5s., to commemorate a peal rung on August 4th, 1883, at Sonning, Berks., which was a centenary performance of a contest between the Oxford and Farnham societies and the College Youths on August 4th, 1783, the result of which was that "this cup, the gift of Mr. Peter Bluck, of Sonning, in the county of Berks., was adjudged to the Society of College Youths for the superior style in which

they rang 1008 Bob Major in a contest with the Oxford and Farnham Societies at the above parish church on Monday, August 4th, 1783." These two cups are still placed side by side in front of the Master's chair at the annual dinner and fortnightly meetings of the Ancient Society of College Youths.

Through having a remarkably retentive memory almost up to the last, Mr. Haworth's stories of bygone events were always most interesting, and we deeply deplore the loss of one whose life reached so far back in ringing history.

His generosity to the Printers' Pension Corporation, noted in the Press recently, affords a striking illustration of philanthropy on the part of a working man. At the graveside in Highgate Cemetery on December 29th, 1910, four members of the St. James's Society (now known as the London County Association), paid their last tribute on handbells, and the whole pull and stand funeral peal, and two courses of Stedman Cinques were rung the same evening by members of the Ancient Society of College Youths at St. Paul's Cathedral.—R.I.P.

THE LLANDAFF DIOCESAN ASSOCIATION.

The annual meeting took place at Llandaff on Monday, December 26th, and was well attended. Proceedings commenced with the reading of the minutes, which were accepted and signed. The election of officers for the ensuing year was the next item, Mr. F. E. B. Charles being unanimously chosen as Master. The Hon. Secretaries and Auditors were re-elected. The place for the next annual and quarterly meetings was next discussed, and it was decided to hold the quarterly meeting at Radyr on Easter Monday next, and the annual at St. Woolos, Newport, on December 26th next. A letter was next read from the Hon. Secretary of the West Wales Association, suggesting that their Association should amalgamate with the Llandaff Diocesan Association. After a long discussion it was decided for nothing to be done at present, with the exception of obtaining the rules of the West Wales Association, and for it to be further considered at a future meeting. As regards the proposed testimonial to the late Rev. F. E. Robinson, it was decided to close the fund on December 31st. Mention was made that more peals had been rung this year than in any one year since the formation of the Association.

Several new members were then elected, and subscriptions taken. Tea was served in the adjoining room, very kindly provided by the Dean.

The Rev. D. Phillips, Rector of Radyr, very kindly took the chair in the unavoidable absence of the Dean.

OAKHAM CHURCH BELLS.

Messrs. Gillett and Johnston, of Croydon, were successful some months ago in obtaining the contract for the erection of new steel frames and the recasting of the whole of the peal of bells for Oakham Church. The work had reached such a stage by Thursday, December 23rd, that a party of ringers, churchwardens, and others were invited to Croydon to see the process of casting the last three bells of the peal and generally inspected the work and works.

The party, numbering twelve, was met at Croydon station by Mr. Johnston and conducted to his residence, where a bountiful luncheon had been provided to which everyone did full justice. At 2 o'clock a move was made

to the works, and Mr. C. Johnston gave an exhibition of carillon chiming, selections from well-known melodies, etc., on the 21 bells in the tower.

The pattern shop was then visited, and patterns from which frames, headstocks, and other parts are moulded were shown in the process of making. The party then adjourned to the bell-casting department and the mysteries of bell founding were lucidly explained by Mr. Johnston, who dealt with the composition of bell metal, the size, shape, thickness and weight of bells in a manner which showed that he was a pastmaster in the art. The molten metal in the furnaces having been tested and found to be of a temperature of 1000° Fahr., the signal was given; the forman moulder knocked a hole in the bottom of the furnace, and a stream of molten metal rushed down the ducts into the moulds and in a few minutes the three bells were successfully cast.

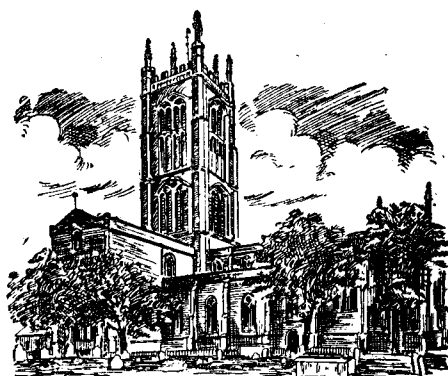
The party next visited the tuning shop where the bells are turned down and tuned on the five-tone Simpson principle, and the process was seen in practical operation. Lastly the seventh bell of the peal having been fixed complete in the frame it was rung and everyone was struck with the fine and beautiful tone it emitted.

A photograph of the party was then taken. Before leaving the works Mr. G. Phillips, churchwarden, moved a hearty vote of thanks to Mr. Johnston for his kindness in inviting them to lunch, and said that the visit had been most interesting, instructive, and enjoyable. Certainly no one could see what they had seen without knowing something more about bells than merely how to ring them, and no doubt the ringers would take a keener interest in their art from the fact that they knew now something about how bells were made.

Mr. Johnston briefly responded, and the party left Croydon Station on the return journey with hearty good wishes for the New Year.

The bells are to be fixed in the tower and the whole of the work completed, as well as Westminster chimes being fixed to the clock, for the dedication by the Bishop of Peterborough on February 24th, 1911.

ST. LAWRENCE, LUDLOW.



The above church is one of the most beautiful churches in the west of England, both inside and out. It is interesting to note that there are 165 steps up to the ringing-chamber, and when you get there you are practically in darkness, as there are no windows. There is a circular lead light let into the floor, through which the ringers can look down into the body of the church. As there is scarcely any light to be obtained from this source,

even for the 11 o'clock morning service, it is absolutely necessary to light candles, which are fixed upon the walls, there being no gas or electric light. This is one of the very few churches in England where ringing for morning service has to be done with the aid of artificial light.

In the year 1902 Robert Marston, esq., then Master of the belfry, was elected Mayor of Ludlow, so that the ringers of St. Lawrence's church are proud to know that they have had among their numbers two gentlemen who have been elected to the high office of Mayor of the ancient borough, which is no doubt unique in the annals of ringing history.

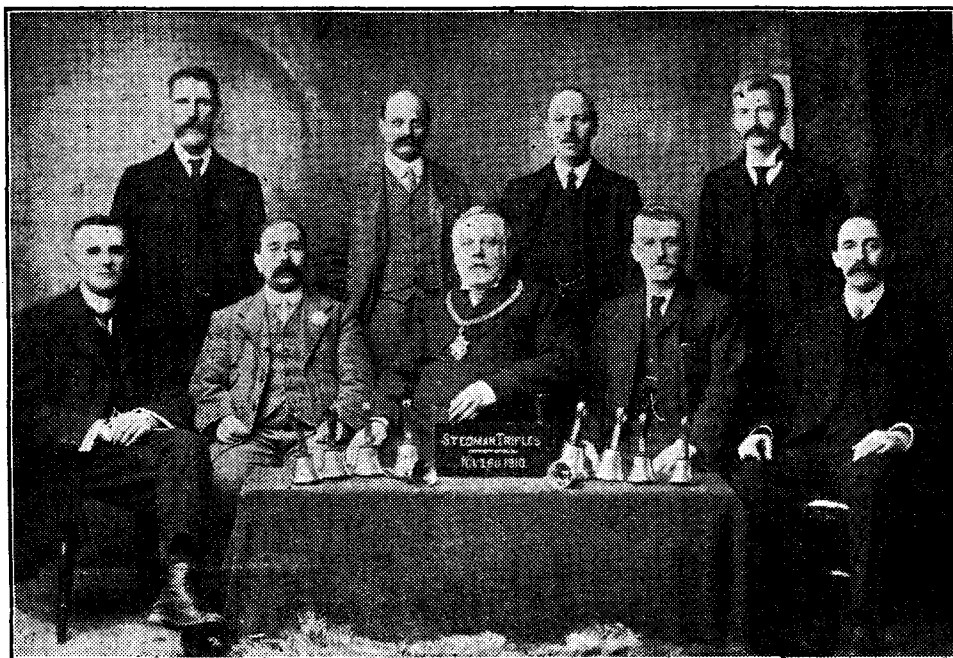

THE MAYOR OF LUDLOW AND BELL-RINGING.

To perpetuate the peal of Stedman Triples which was rung at the church of St. Lawrence on Saturday, November 26th, 1910, the Mayor of Ludlow has very kindly presented to the church a very handsome marblette peal tablet, which was unveiled on Wednesday, December 28th. There were present at the ceremony the Rector (Rev. A. E. Lloyd Tennyson), Mr. E. Richard Marston, representing the churchwardens, Mr. W. Woodhouse, representing the Mayor of Ludlow (Councillor George Woodhouse), Mr. J. C. Galloway, and the ringing members of the local Guild. After a short service, which was held in the ringing-chamber, the Rector called upon Mr.

W. Woodhouse to unveil the peal-tablet on behalf of the Mayor, who was unavoidably absent owing to indisposition. One and all were delighted with the tablet, and Mr. Marston, one of the churchwardens, asked Mr. Woodhouse, jun. to thank the Mayor for his handsome gift to the church. The bells were then rung, and several touches were successfully brought round. The peal-tablet was supplied by Caspar and Co., of London, both the design and workmanship being of the highest class.

CAMBRIDGE SURPRISE.

SIR,—I wish to draw Mr. James's attention to the 7200 of Cambridge Royal on page 574 of your last issue, and also the last 5040 on the same page. As Mr. James is aware it was pointed out in this journal in 1908, the 7200 was composed as 6000 of Treble Bob Maximus by the late H. Hubbard. Now Mr. James simply adds three bobs at H in every alternate course and publishes it as 7200 of Cambridge Royal. Only a few weeks ago Mr. Carter published it as a 5000, but when I drew his attention to it he most honourably withdrew his claim. The 5040 Mr. James publishes I got out myself last August, but on examination I found it was only Hubbard's peal with the calling of the first part reversed, so I could not see my way clear to publish it under my name. I shewed it to several well-known ringers, who were of the same opinion as myself. If composers are going to add three bobs at H and claim other author's compositions it will be interesting to know where we are going to draw the line. It has always been understood that when a composition is produced for one method and the calling happens to apply to another he still claims it. And I should have thought Mr. James would have been one of the last to rob a departed hero of his honour.

SIR,—I must ask Mr. Carter to withdraw his name from the peals of Cambridge Maximus in your issue of December 24th, as I had the peals before his peals of Cambridge Royal were published.

CAMBRIDGE ROYAL.

SIR,—The 7200 Cambridge Royal by Mr. Law James in your last issue is really a simple reduction of Middleton's peal of Major, and should be given to him, as is now universally done with Johnson's well-known reduction to 5056 by means of a bob before. If you call a bob at home in the first course of the first part of Middleton's peal, you bring up the second course—end of the second part and reduce the peal to nineteen courses or 6840 of Royal. By doing this in two parts you reduce the peal to eleven courses, or 5800 of Maximus. If you call this bob in every part you get the following:—

And this four times repeated gives 7200 of Royal, every bit of which is directly taken from Middleton's peal, and which you can reduce to 5040 by omitting bobs at home. By calling a bob at M in the third course of first part you produce the last course of the fourth part, and so get a 5400 of Royal.

This reversed Mr. James gives as his composition, dated January, 1899. These peals can all be got from the Major, without the slightest knowledge of the false course—ends of the method, and cannot by any standard be considered original.
