St Anne's Limehouse – A "new" ring of bells for London

Limehouse

We shall probably never know what led chalkburners in the 14th-century to set up their kilns in the sparse riverside hamlet to the West of the Isle of Dogs. Outside the boundaries of the City of London, they processed lime which was used principally as plaster in the construction of wooden buildings; from it Limehouse appears to have derived its name.

The place also offered a convenient anchorage to vessels bound for the city awaiting discharging, loading or sailing orders; so the hamlet became increasingly involved maritime activities.

During the 15th- and 16th-centuries the population grew not only from its developing riverside activities but because its open spaces offered a pleasant and convenient location for the better off ships' captains, maritime officials and other public servants who wished to be away from the noise and smells of the city, but near enough to their place of work.

There are indications of disorderly conduct and unruly elements during this time, but it was also an age of adventure. The inns and taverns along the waterfront must have echoed with the stories of the hardships and conflicts in which local seamen were involved.

With this growing community, it seemed that a local church was needed. In 1714 the building of Limehouse Parish Church was begun and in 1730 it was consecrated, its well-known tower has been a landmark for seamen using the river for more than two and a half centuries.

In the 19th-century, enclosed docks were opened and controlled wharves established along the river partly because the East India Company's frigates were sitting targets for smugglers and pilferers when lying awaiting discharge.

It was mainly towards the end of the century that the Chinese began to appear in Limehouse in numbers. It became the original "Chinatown", with restaurants, provision shops, clubs, a Christian mission, and even a temple. On the whole the Chinese lived peacefully and stories of opium dens and warring factions were grossly exaggerated, to the detriment of Limehouse, but to the advantage of those who organised visits for tourists from the West End!

In 1939, the outbreak of the Second World War necessitated the evacuation of the area. Bombing raids caused extensive damage, and after the war many of its original inhabitants did not return. In the next two decades, much of the area was replanned and rebuilt, but with the changes in shipping and transport industries, its maritime character began to disappear and the docks fell idle.

Now, various new developments such as the Canary Wharf complex - including the

country's tallest building - are in differing stages of completion and transport links have improved considerably.

So the old is now being swept away or reborn in a new guise. Not everyone will like the "New look" to Limehouse, but no one can say it is dead

Fifty new churches

The 1711 Act, prolonging a coal tax to pay for 50 new churches in and around London and Westminster, was the reaction of the new Tory Government to the discovery that 340,000 of the inhabitants were not provided with Anglican churches, and to the alarming spread of nonconformity.

It was something of a political manifesto, since the Tory party was High Church, they were not just to be places of worship, but also monuments. The Commission was composed of churchmen and officers of the Government and included the architects Sir Christopher Wren and John Vanbrugh. Nicholas Hawksmoor and William Dickinson were appointed Surveyors, whose prime duties were to seek out suitable sites and assess the plans for the new buildings.

Wren, nearly 80 years old, took a grandfatherly interest in the Commission and promptly set out, in an open letter, the principles that he had learned in nearly 50 years of designing churches. They should be built among the inhabitants, not on the fringes of the cities. No burials should be allowed in them. They should be prominently situated and adorned with porticoes "both for beauty and for convenience ... together with handsome spires and lanterns rising in good portions above the neighbouring houses". Portland stone would be the best material with good bricks and roofs of oak.

Three new churches in Stepney

In a flurry of enthusiasm the plans were drawn up and models made. Hawksmoor's designs for three new churches in Stepney soon followed - Stepney parish had become far too big for the church of St Dunstan's they were to be Christ Church, Spitalfields, St George-in-the-East, and St Anne's, Limehouse. In 1714, the land was purchased for Limehouse parish church and the designs could become reality. However, in the same year the Whigs again gained power, dismissed the Commission and set up another without any architect members.

Lacking political and missionary impetus, the work became routine and the artistic zeal of the early years died. Much time was spent in assessing the achievements of the first Commission, and in 1718, it was discovered that their predecessors had committed themselves to £161,000, a sum far beyond their means. Thereafter, the annual allowance was reduced to £21.000

Fortunately, building was by then well under way in Limehouse. By 1718, the church was roofed and in 1719, the tower was finished. The encroaching shortage of money then began to pinch, and pilfering interfered too; work slowed down. By 1725, however, the church was finished, the whole cost having risen to £32,232.8s.6d.

By 1733, the Commission was virtually wound up. Only 12 new churches had been built - six designed by Hawksmoor. The tower of St Michael Cornhill had been rebuilt, the west towers of Westminster Abbey had been finished and three new chapels had been embellished.

St Anne's lays unused

For four years the fine new church of St Anne's lay unused because there were no funds to pay for the minister's salary, but on 14th May 1729, Limehouse was constituted a separate parish and, in response to a petition from the parish, Parliament provided a capital sum of £3,500 for the minister. On 12th September 1730, the church was consecrated by Bishop Gibson of London.

The great fire of 1850

At seven in the morning of Good Friday, 29th March 1850, a fire was discovered in the church. Although the bells were rung immediately, they (Continued overleaf)

attracted onlookers rather than helpers and within three hours the church was gutted.

The decision to restore the building was presumably dictated by the terms of the insurance policy, but was also an act of homage towards Hawksmoor, whose vigorous classical architecture was greatly admired by a number of mid-Victorians.

Fortunately only three months previously the fabric had been insured at $\pounds 5,000$ at the request of Joseph Adams, a dissenting but prudent churchwarden, so that funds were not entirely lacking. But $\pounds 15,000$ was needed and the remainder was raised over a number of years by voluntary effort.

The reconstruction was entrusted to Philip Charles Hardwick, the son and grandson of distinguished classical architects. he was 38 when he received the commission to restore St Anne's. he made an excellent, self effacing job of it. The new roof, of very wide span, was constructed on an identical pattern to that over Hardwick's Great Hall at Euston Station.

The restored church was re-dedicated on 26th April 1857, after all debts had been paid. Altogether the restoration of St Anne's was one of the most sensitive and careful of the mid-19th-century; it shows how good Victorian restoration could be and how excellent was the quality of English craftsmanship at that time.

The current repair work

Fifteen years ago, St Anne's was a sorry sight. Blackened with age and vandals' fires, surrounded with corrugated iron, its windows were regularly broken and the tower was full of dead pigeons.

Funding and launching a restoration scheme takes time and energy. As long ago as 1962, John Betjeman was encouraging funds to repair the Hawksmoor churches, but work accelerated in the last decade, following the founding of Care for St Anne's in 1980. Generous funding from the London Docklands Development Corporation enabled repairs to begin on the first of four restoration phases.

In Phase I, the outside of the east end was cleaned and repaired, and a parish room was formed in the crypt. In Phase II, the north and south walls were cleaned. The roof also needed extensive repair.

Phase III (1987-92) was devoted to works on the west tower. Again, the stone was badly damaged by pollution, weather erosion and cracking and spalling from rusting iron cramps. The clock was also restored. Meanwhile, down below, repairs were undertaken to the interior and exterior of the Great West Porch and the first stage of a much needed heating system was installed.

Unfortunately insufficient money was raised to pay for a new ring of bells to be installed, although the tower was prepared ready to receive them, including forming a ringing room and inserting a sound control floor. The aim is now to install the bells in the next 18 months, before Phase IV gets underway. Phase IV will focus on the interior. The plaster and joinery of the nave and ancillary rooms will be repaired, the organ will be overhauled, the pews reordered, the heating system completed, and the lighting improved.

In essence the aim from the commencement of Phase I, has been to carry out the repairs with as little interference to the historic fabric as possible. The work thus far has been so impressive that in 1990 the Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings chose the restoration of the Tower of St Anne's as the first

recipient of the Sir John Betjeman Memorial Award for conservative repairs to churches and chapels.

The bells

Unlike the other two Hawksmoor churches in Stepney, St. Anne's was never provided with a change-ringing peal of bells. St. George-in-the-East had a 32cwt ring of eight and Spitalfields had a 44cwt ring of twelve.

Those at St. George-in-the-East were destroyed by enemy action during the war and have since been replaced by a new 6cwt ring of eight, cast from the metal of a redundant ring of six from a church in Hornsey, North London.

At Spitalfields, the original twelve were lost during a fire on February 17 1836, and were replaced by a $33^{1/2}$ cwt ring of eight. After the war, these were in a derelict state and were sold to pay for a new $17^{1/2}$ cwt ring of eight, transferred for the redundant church of St Stephen, Clapham Park.

Thus the bells from other churches hang in Hawksmoor's other two Stepney churches. Curiously, if all goes according to plan, something similar will happen at St Anne's. *St Anne's original bells*

* Before the Good Friday fire, St Anne's had a single 38cwt bell inscribed:

"At proper times my voice I'll raise

and sing to my subscribers praise

It was replaced after the 1850 fire by two bells weighing 5 cwt and 17 cwt and a third was added in 1872 to enable the clock to strike the quarters.

St Paul, Homerton

Meanwhile in 1870 the church of All Hallows, Staining, Mark Lane, EC3 had been demolished, all except the tower which still remains standing. The bells were removed and five were recast in 1890 to form a new ring of six with a tenor of 8cwt in A.

They were transferred and hung in the tower of the new church of St Paul, Homerton, at the expense of the Grocers' Livery Company, the patrons of the living. The Grocers' company kept the sixth bell, dated 1458, replacing it with a new one. The old bell, cast by a Belgian founder, is the oldest dated bell in London and July 14, 1995

still hangs at the entrance to the Grocers' Hall in Princes Street.

In 1982, the church of St Paul Homerton became redundant and its Rector, John Pearce, offered the bells to Limehouse if St Anne's could pay for the cost of removal. With help from the London County Association of Church Bell Ringers, a team of volunteers led by Roger Booth, Richard Harris and Roger Bailey dismantled the bells, lowered them to the ground and took them to the Whitechapel Bellfoundry for safe keeping.



Psittacosis is not generally fatal. Indeed it is possible that many of us have had the condition without realising it. However it can cause pneumonia which is an extremely dangerous condition, even in young and otherwise fit individuals.

So What Is The Bottom Line?

Psittacosis is rare, even among bird fanciers and not usually too serious. nevertheless as we saw last year it does occur and it can be very serious. The risk of infection can be minimised, but not totally eliminated, by wearing a face mask. This is good practice in any case as dust inhalation is irritant and can in itself evoke an allergic reaction.

Even if you have taken these precautions, be aware of the possibility of infection. If you develop symptoms such as those described above, do inform your G.P. that you have been in contact with birds and bird droppings.

So remember

PREVENTION

Keep your tower bird proof and clean.

PROTECTION

Wear a face mask when working in the tower.

AWARENESS

Be aware that the disease exists, and what the symptoms are.

Be safe but not paranoid. Psittacosis is a serious condition, but a rare condition.

Psittacosis

The death recently of a member of the Lewisham District (K.C.A.C.R.) from psittacosis, apparently contracted from pigeon droppings encountered while working in a bell tower, set alarm bells ringing in many quarters. What is psittacosis? How common is it? How serious is it? – clearly in this case it was fatal, but it this an exceptional case? What are the symptoms? How is it contracted? Most of all, what should we, as ringers, be doing about it?

Enquiries of the local authority Environmental Health Department (Bexley Borough) failed to provide the answers to these questions. However, Dr Richard Morgan, a consultant physician specialising in thoracic and respiratory medicine at Charing Cross and Westminster Hospital, London, and a member of the Guild of Medical Ringers, was able to provide specialist information on psittacosis and its treatment.

The Facts

Psittacosis (recently renamed ornithosis) is caused by a sub-bacterial organism (it has many characteristics in common with both bacteria and viruses). The organism is carried by many species of bird, but primarily parrots, budgies and poultry and less commonly by pigeons. Infection is probably acquired by inhaling dried particles of infected excreta. Transmission from man to man is rare.

The clinical illness varies in its intensity, but is worse in older people and those with chronic heart or lung diseases, particularly smokers. There is an incubation period of one to two weeks, and the symptoms are flu-like in nature: high fever, headache, muscle pains, chills and coughs. This may progress to pneumonia or a generalised septic condition. The illness usually subsides in the second week but in some cases it can be prolonged with relapses.

The condition responds well to treatment with certain antibiotics, but these are **not necessarily the first choice agents to treat other bacterial pneumonia**.

Harrisons of Barton on Humber

The correspondence on the subject of the Harrisons of Barton on Humber was most interesting. Obviously, having their business only just across the river, they carried out a fair amount of work here in Yorkshire, so I thought I'd add my bit to the sum of knowledge.

Last Friday, I was helping with the preparations for our annual tower Open Day at St Mary's. Beverley (again, a highly successful P.R. event with over 400 visitors) when the Church caretaker offered to open up the priests' rooms (14th century accommodation for a chantry priest). So Paul and I went up to have a look. All sorts of ancient relics including the top half of a bell dated 1599. But also - part of the 1744 bell frame installed by James Harrison and having this carved inscription -

Saml. Johnfton Vcr 1744

Thos Berriman Churchwdns Robt. Appleton Willm. Nelfon Walter Wride Jas. Harrifon of Barrow in Lincolnshire Bellhanger

and with it this article on the Harrisons by Brian Pearson of Driffield -"with his renowned brother, John, famed for their clocks it is unusual to find James referred to, as he is here as a 'bellhanger'.* While the Harrison brother were trained as carpenters, these remarkable men made in the 1720's, the most accurate clocks in the world using an improved equation of time tables, i.e. the difference between true and apparent sun time and using 'clock stars' to check the time keeping of all their grandfather clocks, which, including bearings, wheels and plates were constructed entirely of wood. John went to London to make steel and brass clocks while James continued to make tower and house clocks in Barrow. His training as a carpenter would enable him to make bellframes. His grandson made the church clock in Driffield and two in Hull?

David Potter's book The bells and bellringers of York Minster reports that in 1733, the whole installation of 12 bells was rehung by Harrison on one level, making them easier to ring. In 1760, when the 11th bell was broken, Harrison wrote to the Dean of York from Skipton, where he was working, recommending consultation with Lesert and Pack of Whitechapel, eventually resulting in them casting the new ring of ten in 1765.

In 1756, Harrison installed a chiming apparatus in Beverley Minster, the winding mechanism of which can still be seen bear the belfry door at the west end of the Minster.

The Beverley and District Ringing Society booklet The Churches of the East Riding of Yorkshire has an article on the bells of Cottingham Church by the Tower Captain, Ian Booth. In it, he states "The bells were rehung in 1752 by James Harrison who was the grandfather of the James Harrison who cast the tenor bell in 1795. Paul Taylor of Loughborough, did not regard James Harrison II of Barton as a particularly good bellfounder, and Cottingham Tenor is probably the best bell he ever cast"

What a day!

In reply to C. S. Dixon (p.660) Tuesday 8th May was VE Day. My father went to work as normal at 4.15am, to help hand-milk 84 cows. He came home to breakfast at 8am.

At 9am, he said to me, "We need one more to ring the bells in celebration of the end of the war in Europe.'

I had never rung a bell, but was given almost three whole minutes of instructions, such as, pull on that fluffy bit and leave go of it, let it go up, keeping hold of the double bit - then pull it down catching the fluffy bit.'

I was then put into rounds - no one standing with me - I know now that the stay took some heavy knocks.

Being a ground floor ring, (5 @ 5¹/₄cwt) several people came to say thankyou and to watch the ringing between their festivities and soon after the opening time at the "Five Bells", up came a one gallon stone bottle full of best bitter paid for and brought to us by the local Blacksmith, who was also Church Warden.

We would ring for 10-15 minutes (call changes) followed by about 10 minutes break.

At about noon the bottle was replenished, this time by the vicar who had a drink with us. Soon afterwards some-one brought us some sandwiches and hot tea, before the pub closed, the landlord sent us another bottle and some sandwiches.

At four o'clock, two of the ringers being cowmen had to attend the afternoon milking, but then returned just about 6pm, when some homemade wine was produced and 10 pint bottles of ale, which we cleared before we stopped ringing at 9pm, to join in family celebrations almost until the dawn. What a day.

It was a privilege to ring at the tower again on VE Day 1995.

A Worthwhile Method

Denis Mottershead's letter in the RW for 9 June about method names including the word 'Victory', reminds me that my grandfather, William Spice, took part in a peal of 'Victory Major' at Gillingham, Kent, on Saturday 12th July, 1919. The report appeared in The Ringing World for 18th July 1919, among a number of 'Peace Peals', and the method was attributed to Bankes James.

The next week E. H. Lewis wrote to say that a quarter-peal; of the same method under the name 'Little Court Major', had been rung at Pulford in 1914, and that a peal attempt at Chester on 23rd June, 1919 had come to grief after 18 courses. In the 1920 peals analysis, the method was referred to as 'Victory Major'

However, in the 1926 collection of Plain Major and Cater methods (produced by H. Law James, E. H. Lewis and J. A. Trollope) the preface contains the following: 'The names of four methods are given somewhat differently from those under which they were first rung No. 78, rung as Victory Major, is slightly altered to Victoria Little Court Major'. It is not clear whether or not this was an arbitrary decision by the Committee. It may well have been, since the name of another method is said to have been altered by 'the band who rang it'

Traditionally, the band which first rings a method to a peal has the ring to christen it, so perhaps the name of the method in question should now revert to 'Victory Major', and be rung as such for the VJ Day celebrations

Learning to Ring

About a year ago I decided to learn to ring. I had been to an Open Garden Day in a local village during which there was a flower display in the church and the tower was open to visitors. A couple of ringers were in the belfry to show off the bells and to let people have a go. I had always been intrigued by campanology since reading *The Nine Taylors* in my youth and I can't resist a challenge so I grasped the offered rope firmly with both hands.

In conversation it transpired that the tower and indeed the district was short of ringers and being semi-retired it seemed like an excellent opportunity to get involved in an interesting and worthwhile activity. I should say that I am a Physicist and Teacher Trainer by profession so I could claim to understand the mechanics of ringing the bells and to be able to assess the method of teaching novices to ring. It proved to be a very interesting and illuminating experience.

Firstly I was told how difficult it was to learn. One local tower captain 'had his pupils pulling off the backstroke for months before he would let them do anything else'. It would take months or even years before I could hope to be even moderately good. It was an 'ancient craft' and therefore shrouded in mysteries which would take me even longer to understand and there were some things that could not be explained. One ringer insisted that a bell is an animate object – and he was an engineer by profession!

My common sense told me that this was probably not the best way to recruit new people and the teacher trainer in me rebelled at the negative way in which it was being presented. In schools we teach pupils all sorts of psychomotor

Leave it alone

I cannot agree with D. Mottershead's suggestion that "London Victory Delight" be renamed "Victory Delight". This is one of the many Treble Bob methods including Woodbine, Violet, College Pleasure, Imperial, City Delight, New London Pleasure and many more practised by the South Yorkshire bands early this century until the Central Council in their wisdom deemed them illegitimate, but now thankfully restored to the repertoire. There are still plenty of un-named Treble Bob methods available to be named whatever you like by simply ringing a 720. As for associations with the boxer Jack London - I doubt it. Woodcock's Victory was another Treble Bob method rung and named long before Bruce Woodcock emerged as a heavyweight just after the war.

I read with amazement the catty little note from a P. R. Johnson concerning peal fees. Whether or not this person thinks that a £1 fee is sufficient is neither here nor there, but what is important is that he should abide by the peal fee which is charged by any tower. Frankly for three hours entertainment on a very expensive piece of equipment £1 is a derisory amount. In all honesty I would have thought that a peal fee of £5 per rope was not unreasonable. Finally to P. R. Johnson I would say that if you seriously feel out of pocket by ringing peals then stop doing so - no one forces you to, take up a cheaper form of entertainment such as collecting car numbers or counting clouds.

skills in relatively short periods of time and I couldn't see why ringing should be any different. As for that tower captain's approach to his pupils, it seemed like a case of petty tyranny. Ringers were certainly appearing to be an odd bunch. However I bit my tongue and pressed on.

I was then put in touch with a tower captain who did a lot of teaching in the area. He had many years of experience and had taught many people to ring and I must say that throughout he was a perfect gentleman. He taught me strictly according to the book and his patience and kindness were exemplary – but it did not work.

The reason was that I could not accept that the method in the book was the only way to learn or even the best way to learn, especially for people like me. I did try to follow his advice but it contradicted some of the most fundamental principles that I had been following throughout my professional life. It was difficult for me as a novice to challenge the method and it seemed discourteous in the light of the effort he was making on my behalf so eventually I gave it up. In thinking about it since I began to wonder what the response of the ringing fraternity would be to my suggestions, hence this article.

In my first lesson 1 was shown the bells and the way they were set. The dangers which could arise from the movement of the massive bell and its effect on the rope were explained. The physics of it is simple and so presented no problem.

However, back in the ringing chamber. The first surprise I received was that I did not start on the lightest bell. If large mass is a potential danger then it would seem logical to start with the smallest bell where the danger would be a minimum. But the next surprise was greater. The bell was rung up first and set and I had to pull it off the top and learn to set it on the other side. The teacher held the rope as well to control it and be ready if anything went wrong.

This seemed to me to be the wrong way to start. When the bell is up it is in its most dangerous position. At the top it has maximum potential energy so it moves fastest as it goes through the bottom of the swing. As it falls the rope produces the maximum amount of slack and it moves fastest into reverse. This combination is the most difficult to control and can do the most damage. The great dangers of breaking a stay were emphasised constantly. It was like learning to drive a car with an instructor who insisted on starting off in top gear and full throttle.

As lessons went on I was given more and more of the stroke until I was trying to do the whole cycle myself. The problem throughout was that I never knew how hard the teacher was pulling on the rope at any point. It was like learning to drive with the instructor holding the steering wheel and having his feet on the accelerator and the brake alongside mine. It was impossible to judge the effect of what he was doing and so work out what I needed to do. In addition the whole operation was aiming at setting the bell which is a very small target and a difficult one to hit. Moreover this method gave me no opportunity to get the feel of the bell in its intermediate positions.

But the worst feature was that I was never shown how to control the bell and rope so as to allow it to come to its safest rest position at the bottom of its cycle. Once having pulled it off the top the only outcome allowed was to set the bell back at the top. If it began to come down the instruction was to pull harder and to continue to try until it was set again at the top.

In short the book method seems to start from the most dangerous position, set the most difficult task straight away and give the least opportunity to get the feel of the bell and build confidence in being able to bring it safely back to rest. This contradicts everything we do in teaching where we would start from the safest position build up the feel of the thing through all the intermediate stages and finally achieve the most difficult bit at the end.I asked if I might try a different method but my teacher insisted that he was teaching me the right way and that what I proposed would only be 'donging it' and not learning to ring.

So why this article? Well, I am still convinced that there must be other methods of learning to ring. In teaching we find that there are always several methods which suit the different personality types. The most important teaching skill is in choosing the method that best suits the pupil.

In my case this is what I needed. In Stage One I wanted to start with the lightest bell because it was the safest. I wanted to start with the bell down because that is the safest position. I wanted to start by swinging the bell through a small arc so that I could feel the pulling force required to do this and the effect of the retarding force that I was able to exert to bring it to rest. This way I would find out how the rope moved during this sequence and what I needed to do to control it. It was a small task with minimum risk and I would soon get the feel of the whole thing at that level.

In Stage Two I wanted to ring the bell up to about a quarter of a turn and bring it back to rest. Then I would take it up again and bring it down part way and take it up again and continue this until I was confident that I had complete control of the bell and the rope at all stages of this cycle.

Stage three would be the same as Stage Two except that I would take the bell up half a turn. First I would learn to bring it down to rest under control. Then I would learn how to take it up or down from all intermediate positions in this arc. Since I was now working with a bigger arc there would be more energy in the bell. It would take more effort to bring it to rest and the rope would be moving faster and further.

Stage Four would be the same as Stage Three except that the swing is three quarters of a turn.

Stage Five would be the same as Stage Four but with an arc of a full turn but without aiming to set the bell.

Stage Six would involve taking the bell right over the top and setting it. It would follow naturally from stage 5 and present no difficulty at all.

The essence of my method is to teach control at all stages from the bottom up and to develop the ability to take the bell further up or down at will. The point of this method is that each stage would be a small increase over the previous stage and therefore easier to achieve. This type of learning structure is the one which builds confidence most surely.

So where do you go from here? Firstly I would be interested in the response of your readers to my analysis. Secondly I would like to discuss with a sympathetic tower captain the possibility of testing my ideas and writing an alternative method of learning to ring.

I would still like to ring myself but more importantly I would like to think that we had a system to which more people were able to respond. Who knows, we might even have a surfeit of ringers in towers across the land. I look forward to further correspondence either directly or through your columns.

It has been pointed out by Ian Fielding that the peal of 6-spliced Surprise Major by Marcus Sherwood in the 1981 CC "Collection of Compositions in Major Methods" (peal no 131) is false as printed. The rubric wrongly states that the peal must be called AABBB, and should read AAABB. It should be noted that the same peal also appears in "Composition 500", with the correct rubric.

I would appeal to conductors who have called this peal to check their records and ascertain which version they used. They are distinguishable by the different number of changes rung in each method: the true version has 768 each C, N, and Y and 896 S, whilst the false one has 832 each of C, N, Y and 704 S.

Induction at Leicester

That well-known ringing cleric, David L. Cawley, F.S.A., has now left Bristol for the city centre parish of St Mary-de-Castro, Leicester. The huge mediaeval building was packed with worshippers for his induction on St Alban's Day, 17th June, 1995.

The legal proceedings took place within the context of a Sung Eucharist, conducted in the old-style Anglo-Catholic fashion. The choir sang beautiful music, and the thurifer produced such clouds of incense that at times it was difficult to see from one side of the chancel to the other!

Father David had, rather typically, secured the attendance of four mitred bishops, the diocesan and his assistant, with those of Ebbsfleet and Guyana. Many other clergy, including the Provost and Archdeacon of Leicester, were robed, wearing red copes or stoles in honour of St Alban. Lay canons and civic dignitaries in their appropriate garb added splashes of colour to the processions.

The Clerical Guild was represented by Stanley Evans, having travelled all the way from Kent, and David Sansum, who had slipped across the county boundary from Derbyshire.

In his sermon the Bishop of Leicester likened the forthcoming ministry of the new Vicar to that of St Alban, the first British martyr, expressing the hope that the fate of that saint, who was beheaded, would not befall the incumbent of St Mary. He reminded us that the leg of the new priest was, beneath his cassock, encased in plaster, the result of a tumble when playing rounders with his Bristol youth club. He hoped that David would play rounders with the youth club of his new parish. This produced a titter; we gathered that there is not one.

At the end of the 1½ hour service the melodious eight of St Mary-de-Castro sounded out across the city. All ringers will from now on be watching developments within the Church in central Leicester.

Mucking, Ugley and sweet Margaretting

When George Eve, Life Vice-President and past Hon. Secretary of the Essex Association, died in December 1991, money then donated was set aside for the purpose of providing a bell. Since that time the Officers and Executive Committee of the Association have been looking for a suitable tower in which such a bell could be hung.

The first possibility was at Basildon, legendary home of Essex Man, but the projected new tower is still at ground level. Next came Steeple Bumpstead, away to the North of the county but repairs to the fabric have exhausted funds so that the proposed renovation and augmentation has been deferred.

It was early this year that Margaretting came into the frame. A pretty name in a county which includes Messing, Mucking and Ugley in its list of villages. Arthur Mee, in the King's England series, said "The timber belfry with four bells four centuries old, and a rare Jesse window, give renown to this little village on the Roman road. No lover of beauty passes it by."

It is the first village wholly outside the modern spread of the county town, Chelmsford, on the road from Colchester to London. The church is not in the village proper but is down a turning half-way to the next village, Ingatestone. Approaching the church the phrase 'the quick and the dead' comes rapidly to mind because right in front of the path into the churchyard lies the Great Eastern Railway. One is advised to leave one's car and hotfoot it across the rails before a train from Liverpool Street to Harwich (for the Continent), Clacton, Frinton (for youknow-who), Ipswich or Norwich comes hurtling by.

The tower is a gem, being mainly constructed of stout timbers with a smaller shingle covered upper section and capped with a typical Essex timber spire. The four medieval bells were tuned and rehung in 1931 in a wooden frame with five bellpits. Margaretting had had an active band of ringers for many years and the current Association report lists seven members, which is more than that of many a six or eight bell band.

When George Even was Hon. Secretary he worked hard to establish and maintain good relations with clergy and in particular with the staff of the Cathedral. Canon John Brown, incumbent of Margaretting, Ingatestone and Mountnessing, was Precentor of Chelmsford Cathedral during much of George's term of office so it is fitting that it is his parish that should be approached by the Association.

A meeting was held on 12th May between representatives of the Parish of Margaretting and the Essex Association, led by Canon Brown and the Master, David Sparling. The proposal to provide a bell in memory of George Eve was well-received and the parish announced that a sum of money in memory of Les Catterwell, a former tower captain, could be used to supply fixtures and fittings. The total cost is believed to be in excess of £5,000 which will include work on the fittings of the existing bells.

The Association is mindful that many from Essex and elsewhere have already given generously towards the £800 currently earmarked for this project but feels that some, possibly many, would like to give more. Others may have missed out first time around and would welcome this opportunity to give.

It is fitting that this appeal falls shortly after the VE Day commemoration. We know that George, who was at the Battle of Monte Casino, and his generation have given us the freedom to enjoy our ringing in the Post-war era. Whatever the reason, a donation however large or small will be greatly appreciated.

Thus St Anne's had a collection of nine bells, some awaiting hanging in their third tower. The plan was to recast some of the bells to form a new peal of eight, the heaviest being the 17cwt clock bell, and to hang them in a new frame. *St Mary, Rotherhithe*

Although this scheme did not proceed because of a lack of funds, an opportunity has since arisen to acquire a second-hand metal bellframe from St Mary's Rotherhithe, which will substantially reduce the overall cost.

We now intend to install this frame in the tower and then to install the bells one by one as funds permit. This does, however, mean that the scheme cannot proceed until St Mary's Rotherhithe have raised sufficient money to commence their project, although they have already raised or been promised £13,500 of the £58,000 needed.

St Peter, Walworth

We were always conscious that remodelling the Homerton bells was not the most efficient way of achieving our objective of a 17cwt eight. A second opportunity has recently arisen, with the decision of the Parish of St Peter, Walworth, SE17 to restore their bells.

The have a 16cwt eight by Thomas Mears, dated 1824, hung in a cramped two tier timber frame, in a tower measuring 10° 6" x 10° 6". Ideally they would like a ring with a tenor of about 8cwt and the parish has agreed in principle to exchange their bells for the Homerton six. These they intend to hang in a new frame for eight.

Both the Southwark and London DAC's have considered the scheme, and discussions are currently taking place with English Heritage in order to seek their approval.

An Index of Obituaries

An old parson once told me that an index was the work of someone who loved his fellow men-- on the basis, I suppose, that once an index is compiled it saves hours of work and frustration. As one who regularly uses indexes, I am sure that this is so!

Of course, the labour of making an index has been reduced by the advent of computers, and the utility of these is amply illustrated by a cautionary tale that I will now relate.

Discussions between Chris Ridley and myself, as members of the Central Council Biographies Committee (the what?), showed that the very narrow remit of the Committee members of the Central Council only - was felt by us to be too narrow, and that we considered the basis should be widened. Of course the more information that is collected, the greater the need to hold it on some sort of database. As a trial in forming such a database, we decided to index obituaries that appeared in the Ringing World over a period, and see how we got on. Chris had the computing facilities (how I wish the promised computer for the Library would arrive!) and I had the information to hand - at least, it was there but had to be looked for.

This is where the slog started. I took an old exercise book, divided it into sections for surnames beginning with A, B etc. and began with the 1911 volume, noting, in the appropriate section, surname, first names (if given, initials if not), title or rank, tower, and reference. I gradually speeded up, and eventually got up to 1945 before space ran out. Then a photocopy was sent to Chris, and he processed it, and after proof correction by me (my writing is not very legible), the information was sorted alphabetically. A touch of a button, and it was sorted into date order; so much for my sort by letter! And finally it was sorted initial alphabetically by tower. If I had been able to input the date myself, this would have cut out the need for proof reading and speeded up the whole procedure.

After all the effort, was it worth it? No doubt 1 am biased, but the answer must be yes. Certainly I have used it several times in my work with the Central Council Library and on each occasion it has saved me time. The database can be expanded to hold other references to the subject and become a more general database and not just an index of obituaries.

Looking at the different versions of the index, various things stand out. In the index in date order, the heavy loss of life in the First World War is immediately apparent from the lists of military, ranks, including three of James Washbrook's talented sons and three of the sons of John W. Taylor, of Loughborough: the loss of life in the Second World War was not so heavy and is reflected in the reduced number of military ranks appearing in the index.

I have also noted in the list of titles or rank those who were bell founders or bell hangers. Bell founders, of course, are well known, but not so well known are those bell hangers who worked for the foundries or indeed worked on their own account, and the index gives a ready reference to these. Noted also in the title section is the title Miss or Mrs. for a lady ringer (no Ms in those days), and it is very obvious how few of these appear in the period covered by the index, a reflection of the slow change in the make-up of the Exercise, beginning at the start of the century and accelerated by the First World War. Of course, with young persons being taught, this would not have much effect on the obituary column until after the period of the index!



John Butler has been ringing at St. Andrew's Church, Bradfield, Berks since 1920, and for 68 of those years has been tower captain.

The index sorted by tower should be useful to those researching individual towers and the ringers connected with them. Because of difficulties of counties, it was decided to omit these. Where a name is ambiguous (e.g. Newcastle) it is qualified to enable it to be identified. The index has the snag that it only indexes the tower or place with which the person was connected at the time of death, and it may be that the person's ringing career had mainly been elsewhere and he/she had moved to the final place of domicile not long before his/her death. This, of course, is an argument for extending the database to include more information!

At present the index only covers the period 1911-45, but work is in progress to bring it up to date, and it is hoped that this will be done by the end of the year. However, I have learnt from our previous experience, and am certainly not doing any sorting - the computer can do that. Then, of course, there is Bell News! JOHN EISEL.

Centenary of Guild Districts in the W. & P.

13th July 1996

The Annual Guild Festival, held at Christchurch on 1st July 1895, marks two momentous changes in the history of the Diocesan Guild (Now Winchester the Winchester and Portsmouth Diocesan Guild. following reorganisation of diocesan boundaries in 1928). The first was the proposition by Mr. John J. Jones of Guildford that Rule 2 be changed to permit the creation of the office of "Master". This was seconded by Mr. George Williams of Brighton, and this motion was carried unanimously. Mr. Jones then proposed the election of the first ever Guild Master, the Revd. R. C. M. Harvey of Eastleigh, and this was seconded by Mr. Hilton of Yateley. This followed several years when he acted as Guild Secretary and Treasurer while the Guild was headed by a non-ringing President, usually an important gentleman of substantial means, from one of the "big houses" of Hampshire or Surrey. Following this, Revd. C. E. Matthews of Hursley was elected as the fifth Hon. Secretary and Treasurer of the Guild.

The second important item was a proposition by Henry White, tower captain at St. Michael's, Basingstoke, one of George Williams' regular peal band, and father of Alice White who, on 12th February 1896, was to ring the Basingstoke treble to a peal of Grandsire Triples conducted by her father, thus becoming the first lady to ring a peal on church bells. Mr. White was clearly the modern day equivalent of "an angry young man", since he rose to his feet to speak without receiving prior instruction so to do by the Guild Officers, and, having broken with tradition, he then had the temerity to suggest a change to the organisation of the Guild. He proposed that the Committee of Management set up a subcommittee to investigate the abandonment of administration via a secretary for Hampshire (Revd. H. A. Spyers of Purbrook) and another for Surrey (Revd. C. E. Matthews, then of Shere), the division of the two counties into seven districts, and the attunement of the historical, 14 Guild Rules to this new arrangement. Perhaps his audacity paid off since, the following year, during elections for Central Council representatives, he came a commendable second, after the new Guild Master, amongst the seven candidates for the four positions. It is also possible that his increase in votes, from 133 in 1890, to 216 in 1896, can be attributed to his effrontery in speaking at the 1895 meeting without prior approval of the Guild Officers. The report of this festival in the pages of "The Bell News", the predecessor of our current "Ringing World" occupies one and a half columns of the issue for 20th July 1895, but Mr. White's proposal is covered in five lines, with no mention of Mr. White! Almost one complete column summarises the sermon preached by Revd. F. E. Robinson (Master of the Oxford Diocesan Guild), and the report is rounded off with the comment "..... The weather, except for one or two showers, was pleasant throughout the day, and contributed in no small degree to a thoroughly successful festival." Surprisingly the proposal was carried, and the Committee of Management (An unwieldly organisation consisting of President, Secretary/Treasurer, both county secretaries, five of the Honorary Members, the Bishop, all the Archdeacons, and one representative from every band in the Guild) not only effected all Mr. White's suggestions, but put forward job specifications for the new district officials (See details from the 1896 Guild Report), and sub-divided Guild towers between the seven proposed districts.

During the Annual Guild Festival held on 13th July 1896, at Dorking, discussion of this revolutionary idea prolonged the morning business meeting from 1030 to mid-day. The decision to adopt the proposed division into districts, and the terms of reference (See 1896 Guild Report) received so much acclaim that Guild records list this as ".... one of the most useful and practical meetings in the annals of the Society. . . . " it is true that the independent organisation of districts as we know them in 1995 did not come about until the equally revolutionary changes put forward in 1903, when the contents of the Annual Guild Report were abandoned in order to print the unbelievable 18 new rules, which were described by the Revd. E. W. Carpenter, Guild Home Rule for the Secretary, as ". . . Districts, subject to a certain amount of central control.... "However, it does mean that 13th July 1996 is the centenary of the formation of Guild Districts, with original member bands as listed below. It should be mentioned that "The Bell News", reporting on this meeting in the issue for 25th July 1896, records on page 142 that this momentous meeting took place in Dorking, fails to mention the formation of districts, but concentrates on the details of the ringing after the meeting, when a complete band would visit the one tower allocated to them, listing details of any touches brought round in the eight towers used. Pride of place was given to Alton, Capel, Portsea and Petersfield bands who were allocated to Ashstead Tower, where the Vicar of Alton AND HIS TWO DAUGHTERS rang in touches of Grandsire Triples. Not only were we at the forefront of district organisation, but 1996 marks the centenary of ladies into ringing!

Obituary

Bob Somerfield

It is with deep regret that I have to report the death of Robert John Somerfield (Bob), on Thursday 18th May 1995 aged 81 years.

Bob, my Grandfather, spent all his life in West Somerset working on the land, on or around the Brendon and Quantock Hills until his retirement in 1982 when he moved to his beloved village of Stogumber. From then until his illness in 1993, he took an active and prominent role in the village's affairs through his many roles and offices.

Perhaps his greatest love after the land he worked on for so long was Bellringing. Bob was a ringer for over sixty years and was one of those rare persons amongst us who learnt to ring before the Second World War, on the bells of St Mary, Stogumber. It was not until 11th June 1949 however, that he was proposed a member of the Bath and Wells Diocesan Association, probably due to his regular movement from one farm to another and his service in the Home Guard during the War. Although Dad's Army's loss, it was the Association's, and in particular Dunster Branch, gain, for from that moment he worked enthusiastically and tirelessly to improve and teach ringing in the area.

My Grandfather's zeal to introduce new people to ringing, particularly the young, never let up and he would travel far and wide to put this ideal into practice. This evangelist approach took an unusual turn one evening in 1963 when, along with his youngest son, Adrian, he visited the local ringers of Holford. One young lady by the name of Ann Platt was present and not only did he get her hooked on our great art but six years later managed to gain her as a daughter-inlaw as well and thus continue the family interest in ringing (I am the unfortunate result!).

It was only natural that sooner or later such a dominant character would be proposed by his peers as their Ringing Master of the Branch and for many years during the eighties he fulfilled that role with as much vigour as his other responsibilities. His efforts were probably doubled after the loss of his wife Christabel in 1981 (he never remarried) and the need to channel his love and energies elsewhere. There was many an evening when the barking commands of Bob and Single would reverberate around a lonely ringing chamber in West Somerset to touches of his favourite method, Grandsire.

The deterioration in Bob's hearing probably endeared him even more to the ringing fraternity, especially when he misheard conversation and reduced a ringing chamber to hysterics. One such occasion was one of his last Branch meetings in 1993 which was report in the RW at the time. After a successful touch of Steadman Doubles, he was heard saying to his neighbour, "I didn't hear that silent single being called!".

The love and affection he gained from his fellow members was shown in an unprecedented way in 1993 when many of Bob's friends and family turned up as a surprise to the Stogumber practice nearest to his 80th Birthday (one of the few secrets he didn't find out about!). This I know was a touching moment for my Grandfather and recognition of his popularity in the area. An ambition that he, my parents and myself all shared came to fruition as part of those birthday celebrations as all four of us rang a quarter peal together at St George, Brompton Regis (the location of Bob's first quarter peal) and his last before his hospitalisation.

Apart from ringing Bob was heavily involved in all aspects of community life. He was Area representative of the Agricultural Workers' Union, a role he continued in after retirement, in which his fair-mindedness and his insistence to listen to both sides of an argument gained him respect from both employers and his fellow workers.

He was also a great support of Meals on Wheels and with his close friend, Barbara Trundle would be regularly seen driving down the lanes in and around Stogumber bringing comfort and company to many.

Yet his service to the Church was also prevalent in his twenty one years as churchwarden of Stogumber. He was never one to dismiss new ideas and he acknowledged the need of change in the Church to gain the young and retain their interest. His unswerving loyalty made the life of the rector of the united benefice a great deal easier. For this total commitment to church and community he was honoured with being presented the Maundy royal gift by HM The Queen in 1993 at Wells Cathedral.

After his illness in the autumn of 1993, Bob was unable to carry on with ringing or his parochial duties. However, this did not mean that he didn't take an active interest in all the going-ons of the area and with the constant visitors in hospital and later in the Old Cleeve nursing home he was kept well informed of events. He was nominally still Tower Captain of Stogumber and his very last act was to make sure a party from the States could ring on the bells as part of their tour. It was also a pleasure for him to see the bells of Old Cleeve re hung and dedicated before his death.

The Service of Thanksgiving held at Stogumber on Friday 26th May was another sign of the love and affection that the local community felt for Bob. The church was filled full with nearly 300 people present, including his large and close family, ex-work colleagues, and of course many of his ringing friends, six of whom rung a half-muffled quarter peal after the service in memory of Bob.

Bob will be very much missed by all. My final thought of him comes from when I was four years old and my very first memory of a Bell tower. One Saturday afternoon he took me to Stogumber and I was mesmerised by the sight of my Grandfather ringing, thinking I wanted to be like him when I grew up, I know I could never fill his shoes, but I hope that in some way I have emulated him in carrying on with the art he so loved. I can now imagine him in the Celestial tower in the sky alongside some of his contemporaries, Bill Middleton, Sid Bryant and his two dear friends Cyril Locke and Bill Nurncombe and the words "Catch Hold!" sounding loud and clear as he directs the ringing. He is survived by four children, six grandchildren and one greatgrandchild.

Dennis Lionel Bromham

Dennis was a son of West Harrow and first set foot on the soil of Leicestershire when he was sent with a detachment of the Royal Artillery to the village of Gumley on searchlight duties in the early part of the war. It was around this time that he met his wife Kath. They married some years later, living throughout their married life in the neighbouring village of Saddington. His whole working life was spent with various breweries as a representative, his last employer being Bass PLC.

Unsure how to fill his time in retirement he was speaking to the Saddington Ringing Master of the time, Chris Deacon, who noticed that Dennis had much interest in the church, liked music and had worked for a brewery. Essential qualities for a potential ringer so, without any delay, Dennis was taught to ring by Chris and Gwenyth Tyler. At the same time Dennis threw himself into village life. He became a member of the P.C.C., local correspondent for the parish magazine, deputy organist and helped at any of the church and village activities which required him.

Dennis became a proficient treble ringer in any plain method. However he particularly enjoyed ringing the tenor at Saddington which he did to many quarter peals and one peal, on 20th June 1990. A significant day because not only was it the ruby wedding of Chris and Lilian Deacon, but also the hottest day in Leicestershire this century; 99 degrees F in the shade and a fair bit warmer inside. Dennis stood there for 2 hours and 40 minutes sweating and tired but determined that he would ring what proved to be his first and last peal.

Dennis was a sociable character and could tell a good tale. Always willing to lend a hand, like the time he offered to help with the washing up at a district meeting he picked up a plastic cup and whispered to those helping, 'I feel much safer with one like this', as he put his hand in to dry it, the cup disintegrated. Fits of laughter drowned the meeting. But that was Dennis. Whether it was welcoming new people to the village or just listening to someone who wanted to talk. A gentleman of the old school who never failed to raise his cap to a lady. Dennis went through life as he went to the bar to get a round of drinks, slowly, gently and stopping to talk to everyone on the way. During the afternoon of 7th June family and friends filled Saddington church for the funeral service, following which Dennis was interred in the church cemetery and a half muffled quarter peal was rung.

Dennis, 74 years old at the time of his passing will long be remembered as follow A Christian gentleman, helpful, thoughtful and kind. These are the memories you leave behind.

Harold Denman

1903-1995

The death of Harold Denman on 20th May 1995 severs one of the last remaining links with pre-war ringing in North Nottinghamshire. Harold was born in the hamlet of Rockley, near Retford, on 6th April 1903 and lived there all his life. In the early twenties he went into farm service at North Muskenham. This was the system, still common at the time, whereby a man contracted to work for a year and generally living in at the farm. It was here he learnt to ring in 1924 and also to swim in the gravel pits, something he continued to do whilst on holiday into his eighties. In 1927 he returned home, working on various farms until 1937 when he started work for the Highways Dept of the County Council ending his working days in the position of foreman in 1968. It was in 1927 he became a member of Gamston tower where he continued to ring for the rest of his life, a total of 68 years. He cycled without fail each Sunday evening, regardless of the weather or how many ringers were present (and many times he was the only one) always staying for services and sitting in the same seat in the south aisle, he joined North Notts Association on May 28th 1927 and served as a committee member from 1931 to 1939. He was also a life member of many adjoining societies and was highly thought of over a wide area. When the North Notts Association became part of the new Southwell Diocesan Guild he was elected district secretary, a post he held for twenty years. He then became chairman for a number of years. Harold was an excellent minor ringer and enjoyed his ringing be it Plain Bob or multi method. His first peal was at Gamston on March 23rd 1929 in three methods conducted by the late R. W. Stockdall and his first as conductor in the same tower on August 13th 1932, His peal total was 477, 407 of which were of minor 201 of these being at his home tower of Gamston. A Competent conductor on six he called 120 peals of minor, 30 of these being for first pealers. He rang in a peal of Bob Major on Coronation Day 1936 at Sutton-on-Trent starting at 6.00 am, and a peal of Trinity Sunday at Warsop on Coronation Day in 1953. It was during the war I first got to know Harold. After the ban on ringing had been lifted Harold was organizing unofficial practice meetings in North Notts as the then secretary, Roy Fowler was on active service overseas and the Association was in limbo. I had learnt to ring at East Markham in 1939 where no change ringing took place and heard of one of these meetings at Tuxford. I walked there after work but the black-out was in force with no late (Continued overleaf)

transport and I arrived just as the meeting was ending. Harold said "If you want to learn change ringing come to our practice at Gamston on Monday night". This began a friendship lasting almost 52 years. He conducted my first peal in Sept 1944 prior to my going in the army and I rang a total of 65 with him. He thoroughly enjoyed ringing outings and his records show he rang in 554 different towers. His last peal was at Gamston in July 1988 at the age of 85 years. He range in a quarter peal of Killamarsh, one of his favourite methods, for his 90th birthday and his last practical ringing was as a helper at the Guild ringing school just over a year ago. He subsequently went on one or two outings without actually ringing. His other hobbies were football and gardening and as a supporter of Notts County he was thrilled to receive a surprise visit from Tommy Lawton on his 85th birthday. His garden was immaculate right up to the end. The death of his wife Rene in December 1993, (they had been married 56 years) was a severe blow but he continued to live alone by choice. He enjoyed good health right up to the end of his life except for deafness which didn't seem to affect his ringing, and the onset of asthma in recent years. He was taken ill with respiratory problems and died in hospital on 20th May. The funeral service was at Gamston on 26th May attended by family, many friends and ringing colleagues and he was laid to rest in the churchyard he tended so well in the shadow of the tower he loved so much. To my great regret I was unable to attend his funeral but ringing friends rang the bells as the cortege came to church and a quarter peal was rung during the internment with the bells half muffled. On Wed 7th June we rang a half muffled peal in his memory, the method again being Killamarsh. All the participants had rung a number of peals with Harold. Our sympathies go to his son Ken and daughter Margaret and their families. As one of my friends remarked, "One of natures gentlemen." May he rest in peace.

Charles John Blain 1913-1995

Charlie was born and brought up in Sandy. He was Christened at St Swithun's and sang in the choir until his voice broke, when he moved to the other end of the church and took up bellringing.

He was apprenticed with George Seamer, a carpenter and joiner across the road from the church and was successful in his City and Guild's certificate. He worked for the Berkley Coach firm in Biggleswade for some years until his skills were required in the war by the aircraft firm Vickers in Surrey. After he war he resumed work in Bedfordshire and was for many years Clerk of Works at County Hall until he took early retirement.

But all along his great enthusiasm was for the church bells and bellringing. Where other people in Bedfordshire talk about brussel sprouts, Charlie would talk about bells. He taught very many people to ring and was the driving force and expert hand in the construction of the ringing floor and balcony which overlooks the church. The money was raised by sponsored walks and other efforts but much of the actual work, including making the ladder up to the ringing chamber, was done by Charlie himself.

His prowess as a ringer and some of the successful peals he shared in achieving will be known and remembered by ringers in the local area and further afield. He was an enthusiastic teacher and enjoyed good ringing.

His other interests included working in his shed and garden, listening to classical music and he was a keen supporter of the local history society.

The funeral service was held at St Swithun's Sandy on Friday 5th June, with a church full of friends, colleagues and ringers. Half muffled ringing before and after the service included representatives from the local tower, district and from further afield, ringing friends from the past.

Although ill health had prevented Charlie from joining us in the ringing chamber for several years, he was always interested in our progress and activities. His handiwork in the ringing chamber provides a fitting memorial to a ringer who for so long was at the heart of ringing in Sandy.

Ralph Chapman 1913-1995

Ralph Chapman died on 27th February 1995, he was born on 22nd May 1913 at Leighton Bromswold, Huntingdonshire where he was to spend the rest of his life. He was the son of the village carpenter, wheelwright and undertaker. He attended the village school which like so many no longer exists. On leaving school he worked for a local farmer until he joined his father, learning his father's trade. One of the things he excelled in was as a grave digger, where he had the reputation of being the finest grave digger in the country. During the war he was in the Home Guard.

He had two main interests, one being cricket which he played for his local team. He went to many of the big cricket matches meeting some of the well known cricketers. His other interest was bellringing. Like his father he learnt to sing at Leighton Bromswold, where they only had a call change band. At this time method ringing was nearly non existent in the country, but on the border of Northamptonshire there was a team of method ringers led by Harry Chapman (no relative of Ralph's) of Keyston who, with Eunice and Billy Whitmore, encouraged Ralph to take up method ringing.

Although for many years there has not been a band of ringers at Leighton Bromswold, Ralph managed to keep the bells ringing with help from other towers. He was associated with many towers in the area teaching a band to ring at Spaldwick. He joined the association in 1937 and wa a regular attender at the meetings. Although he rang many quarter peals he only rang 5 peals including the coronation peal for the Queen at Godmanchester.

Ralph was a very outspoken person, spending many an evening in the pub putting the world to rights, innkeepers and parsons at the top of his list, even so he was a very likeable person with many people visiting him when he became ill during the last few years of his life either at his home or while he was in hospital. Ralph never got married, but he never wanted for anything during his illness right until the time of his death, he was very well looked after by his friends and neighbours.

His funeral service was on a bright, sunny day on 9th March at Leighton Bromswold Church where members of the Huntingdonshire Church Bell Restoration Society, which Ralph also belonged to, helped to dig his grave by the side of his parents. The death knell had been rung the week before and as was the custom at Leighton Bromswold on the day of the funeral, the funeral invitation bell was rung an hour before the Service and the tenor tolled at minute intervals for half an hour.

When the hearse arrived in the village it stopped at the other end of the Church. The bearers walked by the side of the hearse with the undertaker (Ralph's bellringing friend Chris Higgins of Higgins Funeral Service) walking in front to the Church gates. Ralph's coffin, which had been specially made in solid oak, was carried into Church by four members of the local cricket club. The Church was full of his many friends and the Service was conducted by the Rev. George North and another bellringing friend, Mr Michael Keck, played the organ. While Ralph's coffin was carried from the Church to the grave the bells rang half muffled for a few minutes.

After the Service the bells were rung again by many of his bellringing friends. Everyone was invited to the Green Man pub to join the locals where a splendid spread of food and drink had been provided. To the villagers of Leighton Bromswold we extend our sympathy and our thanks.



The Maidstone District Annual Striking Competition was held at Chart Sutton on a typical June day - cold and grey. Fortunately the morning rain had stopped, which meant that at least those bands awaiting their turn to ring didn't get wet. Chart Sutton being a ground floor ring, we were barred from the nave lest the bands were distracted during their test piece.

Our judge this year was Keith Wakefield of the neighbouring Tonbridge Distict. He made the interesting observation that the first four bands rang at exactly the same pace (3 hours 6 minutes peal speed) whilst the fifth band rang faster (3 hours). This was clearly a better speed for the bells, as Keith declared them winners with only 31 faults. No prizes for guessing the identity of the winning band -All Saints Maidstone! A scratch band came second with 47 faults followed by last year's victors Linton with 55.

For the second successive year only four bands, plus a scratch band, entered. This is disappointing for a competition that used to attract double that number only a few years ago before the eligibility rules were tightened. Let us hope for a better response next year.


