# The bells of Liverpool's bombed-out church

As the commemorative peals and quarters for the anniversary of V.E. Day drew to a close last May, one could not help but think poignantly of those bells destroyed by enemy action during the war and unable to celebrate fifty years of peace . . . St. Bride Fleet Street, Clifton Parish Church, St. Sidwell Exeter, Charles Church Plymouth, Holy Rood Southampton . . . The list is a Roll of Honour and few ports escape mention. Here in Liverpool, nestling in the shadow of Gilbert Scott's mighty Cathedral, St. Luke's, has remained a burnt-out shell since May 1941. Known locally as 'The Bombed-Out Church', this silent and melancholy ruin has both haunted and fascinated generations of Merseyside ringers since its destruction over half a century ago . .

Twenty years to complete

Rising above a graceful flight of stone steps at the junction of four major thoroughfares, St. Luke's Church is one of the noblest buildings in the city of Liverpool. It is a well-known landmark, and its commanding tower provides a distinguished focal point east of the city


The church was designed by John Foster who was the Corporation Architect and Surveyor and construction began in 1811. Due to several legal wrangles concerning land ownership, the building took twenty years to complete and was finally opened for public worship on 12th January, 1831, it became known as "The Doctors' Church", due not only to the associations of its patron saint but also to the high proportion of surgeons resident within its

Early in 1829, a ring of eight bells was installed in the newly-built tower. Their details

All Saints, Newton Heath, Manchester. They cost £645, but on arrival were deemed too heavy for Newton's rather squat church tower. A period of indecision followed, during which various schemes were suggested strengthening the tower. In the meantime the bells lay abandoned for some considerable time on a nearby canal wharf. They were finally taken to the Huddersfield Canal Warehouse in Piccadilly, Manchester, where they remained in storage for a number of years.

Eventually, the trustees of Newton Heath Church placed a series of advertisements in Wheelers' Manchester Chronicle, and the bells, together with their fittings, were auctioned at The Bridgewater Arms, Manchester, on 23rd March, 1825. They were apparently purchased for the sum of £397 by one Frederick Fincham, a local bleachingpowder manufacturer who later sold them on to the Corporation of Liverpool. The Newton trustees purchased a bell from Oldham Parish Church for their own tower in 1824, and a chime of eight Harrington tubular bells was also installed later in the century. None of these bells now remain in Newton Heath tower, only an 11% cwt Mears bell of 1854.

# Earliest metal bell frame

The bells were transported to Liverpool via canal, probably during the first half of 1828 and (Continued overleaf)

were installed in St. Luke's belfry later that year. They were hung by a local bellhanger called George Gillebrand on what is believed to have been the first metal bell frame ever constructed. Gillebrand's frame is of remarkable design and it survives today in the gutted belfry, having withstood a German incendiary device in 1941. Its construction anticipated technology not generally adopted by English bell hangers until the 1870s and there is evidence to suggest that Gillebrand had been considering the use of cast iron for bell frames, as early as 1824.

#### Bells too loud

The bells were rung for the first time on St. George's Day, 23rd April, 1829, and the first peal (5056 Kent Treble Bob Major) was rung on 6th July that year. Although there was a reasonably proficient band of changeringers in Liverpool at this time, the peal was rung by the ringers of Manchester Collegiate Church. The composition used was was later discovered to have been false, but in the meantime the noise level outside the tower was rapidly proving unpopular with local residents. Tense debate was aroused in the local newspapers and the Surveyor investigated the Corporation possibility of rehanging the bells in the tower of St. Martin-in-the-Fields, Vauxhall, a far less salubrious parish, some 11/2 miles to the north of St. Luke's, where, in the words of a contemporary reporter, "their noise would annoy plebian ears only"!

Eventually, the southern louvre openings, overlooking housing immediately below the belfry, were partially boarded up and the matter appears to have been dropped. In 1835, a very fine clock was installed in the tower by James Condliff of Fraser Street, Liverpool. It struck the hours on the tenor bell and told the time of the four carved stone dials which had always been a design feature of the tower.

Seldom rung

Despite indications that a St. Luke's ringing society had been formally constituted, it would appear that the bells were seldom rung after 1829 and had remained entirely silent from 1836 until 22nd September, 1844, when they were reopened for regular ringing at the expense of the Corporation.

Ringing continued throughout the remainder of the nineteenth century, interspersed with significant periods of silence. A brief significant periods of renaissance took place during the final decades of the century when a number of peals were rung, although the bell fittings were showing signs of deterioration by this stage. Ringing took place only infrequently after the turn of the century and the bells were generally sounded with an Ellacombe chiming apparatus which had been installed in 1876.

The belfry was inspected by John Taylor & Co. of Loughborough in July 1922, and a report and estimate for rehanging was submitted to the church authorities. The recommended work was never carried out, although Ronald Edwards of Bidston became interested in the bells and undertook a vast amount of repair work to the installation. Ringing became possible once more and a peal of Cambridge Surprise Major was rung on 19th October, 1931. This was the fortyfourth and final peal to be rung in the tower.

The belfry

A visit to the belfry at this time would have begun beneath the tower, in the choir vestry with its plaster-vaulted dome. From here, the southeastern vice led via 48 steps to the ringing chamber. This was a spacious and lofty apartment, illuminated by three great windows.

Large wooden settles were recessed into each window-opening and the bare wooden floorboards were uncarpeted. A small, square opening in the eastern wall gave access to the nave roof space and two iron lamp brackets provided further illumination. The rope circle was excellent and also quite large, although the unguided draft was rather long. Four peal boards adorned the bare stone walls and the Ellacombe chiming apparatus was probably mounted on the eastern wall. A wooden shaft ran down each of the two western corners, containing the clock weights which fell to the chamber at the back of the gallery below. The spiral staircase also gave access to the clock chamber after which the bell chamber and tower roof were reached by a rather precarious system of ladders.

The very last time that the bells were rung is not known, although it was probably some time towards the end of 1938. Despite the apparent problems with the installation, the 'go' of the bells is recorded as having been surprisingly good and they are said to have been a pleasant, mellow tone.

Unringable

On 29th November, 1938, Taylors wrote to the churchwardens, offering to carry out a free inspection of the bells when they were next in Liverpool and submit a report and estimate for their rehanging. Eactly what happened next is unclear, although further deterioration may have resulted in some significant damage to the bell installation, for the bells were recorded as being unringable in the Lancashire Association's 1938-39 Annual Report. They were to remain completely silent for the brief remainder of their existence.

Church completely gutted
Like most large ports, Liverpool suffered great damage during the second world war and much of the city-centre was devastated during the Blitz of May 1941. On Tuesday, 6th May, St, Luke's received a direct hit some time between 00.20 and 04.15 am. The church was completely gutted during the ensuing blaze although the bell frame remained intact. Three of the bells were badly cracked and broken whilst the remaining five fell to the tower floor and were smashed to

On 26th May, the Vicar, Rev. Capt. Hedley Ballance, wrote to Taylors with the following request.

In consultation with my Warden I am instructed to ask that you be good enough to undertake the work of salvage and storage of our bells at your early convenience. At the moment the smaller broken pieces are at the mercy of the looter.

In the meantime, no attempt was made to protect the broken bells and when Taylors collected them in mid June, almost 12 cwts. of metal had gone missing. The surviving metal was stored at Loughborough until March, 1965,

when it was eventually sold to the foundry for scrap, the decision having finally been taken not to rebuild the church nor reinstate a ring of bells in its tower.

#### Gaunt shell

Thus St. Luke's stands today, a gaunt shell without roof or glazing. Shards of stained-glass still cling to the empty tracery of the window openings and there remains an air of abandonment about the place, like some great, stone Mary Celeste. A metal grille guards the west doorway and a heavily padlocked, rusty iron door defends the entrance to the tower stairs

The staircase itself is in excellent condition but there is no longer any floor to the former ringing chamber. A loosely-boarded opening off the spiral staircase reveals a scorched wooden settle clinging precariously to the north wall, with a menacing drop to the stone floor some thirty feet below. A wooden ceiling has been erected above to support the replacement clock which was installed by the City Council in 1974 and a further ceiling above the clock protects it from the weather and also acts as a floor to the bell chamber.

The massive cast iron bell frame installed by George Gillebrand remains intact in the roofless belfry, although the timber beams which once supported it perished in 1941. The frame remains in remarkably good condition despite over half a century's exposure to the Liverpool weather. In view of it being the earliest recorded example of a cast iron bell frame and also the quality of workmanship, it remains a monument to its creator and to the Industrial Revolution.

Post Script

Some fifteen years ago, members of the Liverpool Branch of the Lancashire Association of Change Ringers, helped remove the long unringable octave from St. Paul's Widnes. These bells have been in store ever since, awaiting a suitable home. The recently constituted Merseyside Bell Restoration Group is seeking to purchase these bells and in conjunction with Liverpool City Council, hopes to install them in St. Luke's tower using Gillebrand's restored bell frame, If this scheme goes ahead, a Ringing Centre will be established in the tower, to serve the North-West. An appeal will be launched in the near future and further details of the project will be available shortly, Watch this space

## Conductors - loud and clear

With the recent passing of Charles Kippin we have, as his obituarist said, lost one of the really outstanding ringers of his generation. Like many others I have fond memories of Charlie and was often grateful for his help and encouragement.

Amongst those memories of Charlie is of his ringing instructions across the room from the end of his rope. They were clear, practically useful and invariably right, but no one could say they were softly spoken. It would not be unfair to say that some learners found them intimidating in the volume and pitch at which they were issued.

For his generation Charlie was by no means unusual in conducting fortissimo. Older readers will be able to name a number who were well renowned both for the loudness of their conducting and the antics they got up to on the end of their ropes.

There were other habits of conductors of that generation: the handbell conductors who leant across and physically restrained your arms until they allowed you to sound your bell. Then there were the 'growlers'; not so noisy and not so helpful either. I remember one who had cultivated a deep throaty growl from which all consonants had been expelled. You had not an earthly idea of what he was saying; you merely got the message that he thought very little of the way you were ringing.

Maybe I move in the wrong circles now but the present generation of conductors seem to have turned the volume down a lot, possibly because they are more conscious of the risk of hurting others' feelings. Now conductors mutter confidentially to themselves and are barely audible, let alone intelligible, to the ringer on the next rope. There are the body language conductors who rock their heads and gyrate their torsos to convey some message; it is peaceful but not usually very helpful. I have not heard a conductor at full volume going beserk at his band for quite some time now!

Of course, no one likes being shouted at and I suppose that has often been a cause of learners giving up. People react differently; some will walk out in a passion and some will stiffen their resolve not to make mistakes and get shouted at. Some take being shouted at personally, but I really cannot think of ever having witnesssed an instance when the shouting conductor meant it personally. Conducting at low audibility for fear of hurting someone's feelings is not really much help. If you take up conducting you soon know that instructions have to be got out crisply and accurately in a very short time indeed and if they sound abrupt, they have to be. If the conductor sounds irritated at the band going wrong repeatedly it is probably because he is irritated but he, or she, might just ask themselves whether they asked too much of their band at that time.

Dare we shout anymore? Surely there are some Charlie Kippins still around in our belfries! Charlie was a great ringer and conductor and the method certainly worked for him - and he was clear, practically useful and invariably right. PHILIP GRAY

Well done, Essex

Following the request by the Ministry of Defence earlier this year that as many bells as possible be rung simultaneously on August 20th as part of the VJ Day commemorations, it was decided to see just how many Essex bells we

could get ringing at the same time.

We knew it wasn't going to be easy, for the simple reason that there are more bells than ringers and, being the middle of the holiday season, some of these were likely to be away, relaxing on some beach somewhere. However, we are not ones to shrink from a challenge and a plan was immediately put into action to increase the number of ringers available. Posters were distributed, radio interviews were given, newspaper reports were printed - all trying to encourage lapsed ringers to come forward and help. I'm sure we all know many people who have been taught to ring but, for one reason or another, have not kept it up. The response was encouraging. A total of sixteen ringers contacted me - most having moved from the area where they used to ring and not renewing their contact with ringing in their new location. (There must be something we can do about this - perhaps a transfer/introduction card?) Some of these people are now firmly established with their new towers and I hope will be made members of the Association soon. Others feel that they are not able, at the moment, to make a regular commitment to ringing but are willing to be approached for special occasions, weddings etc. when they will help if they can. I hope that

contact will be maintained so that in the future ... well, one never knows

The local radio station maintained an interest in what we were doing throughout and a joint television and radio interview was broadcast two weeks before the day when both some young learners and an older ringer who had served in the war, were interviewed. A further radio broadcast was made on Sunday 13th on the radio's religious programme when details of many other VJ events were publicised.

The telephone was red hot during the week prior to the 20th with tower captains from all over Essex ringing in to tell me what their ringing arrangements were. The map on the wall next to the 'phone soon became very colourful as each tower that intended to ring especially for VJ Day was highlighted in one colour, those that intended ringing at 12 o'clock in another colour and those that were unable to ring in yet another.

The only churches that I was unable to record were the growing number of churches with bells hung for chiming who asked if they could join in. The chiming four at Elsenham, chimed by George Powell, the three at Rainham, one at Tiptree and many others made this a very 'Essex' event and most of us felt we were part of a small piece of

On the day over 100 churches had tower bells ringing, many of these ringing quarter peals and some peals, which will be recorded later and of these, there were at least seventy which rang at 12 o'clock. Many, many thanks to you all. It was a great achievement. And for those people in Essex who live near a church which was unable to ring, BBC Essex Radio went to the church of St. Peter & St. Paul, Grays to broadcast the bells at 12 o'clock for all to hear. I can't confirm that this actually happened, for like most other ringers in Essex, I, too was on the end of a bellrope ringing with two of the lapsed ringers we had encouraged to come and help. Well done, Essex

# The right atmosphere

I have been following with interest the correspondence in your columns regarding advantages offered by different methods of teaching, i.e. bell up or down, backstroke, handstroke, etc.

The debate has raised many useful points. However, it covers only half the subject and it is surely equally important to say something regarding the atmosphere in which learners are taught.

As someone who, through university and a demanding professional career, has suffered many of life's stresses and strains, I have found learning to ring as a mature student one of the most challenging of all enterprises. Not all of these challenges were probably really necessary, so from a learner's point of view may I therefore offer the following advice to teachers/tower captains (often one and the same person).

These observations have been formed over recent years whilst attending a number of practices in local towers all of which have emerging bands; they are not confined to one teacher or one tower. (I am not sure if this is

good or bad). 1. Do make your learners feel welcome when they arrive. Do not grunt, ignore them or look dismissively the other way.

After all, you rely on them for service ringing.

2. Do not, at the start of practice or service ringing, immediately call for the most complicated touch of which the band is capable, and then get cross if it goes This establishes an uneasy atmosphere for the rest of the session. Try ringing something straight-forward first of all. Remember that people do ring better

when they are relaxed and confident. 3. Do not assume, when ringing something which a learner has newly mastered, that it is invariably his/her fault if it goes wrong, and lay blame accordingly. Many times it is someone more experienced who has made the mistake

4. Do resist the desire to ceaselessly call every touch yourself. In particular, teach and encourage the learners to call

whenever possible.

5. If, on a practice night, a stronger than usual band is present, this offers an excellent opportunity for everybody. Include the learners in this, asking if there is anything they have been studying that they may wish to ring or call. If a learner does make a request, do not refuse him/her loudly in a disparaging and dismissive way. Be supportive. If you don't want them to ring or call, explain why.

6. If a learner advises that he/she is having trouble "getting their brain around something", do not exercise razor-sharp wit by flashing back "what brain? Learners can be sensitive and deserve

encouragement.

7. If planning to call a touch on a method previously rung by the band to plain courses only, warn everyone that calls will come this time, and ensure that they have

refreshed their memories on what the work will be. Do not make the calls unexpectedly and then get annoyed if it is not rung correctly. This is demoralizing to the learners.

8. If you know of at least 4 or 5 beginners/learners who no longer ring at your tower, don't assume they have all given up because they are bored with ringing. Examine your methods, and the atmosphere existing in the tower.

9. Do consider holding an election to tower captain at least every two years. Stand down alternately. Maybe you are the most fitted candidate for the title, but you may find that different people respond to different atmospheres. After all, you can always stand again next time.

10. Finally, and above all, remember the words of Wilf Moreton in his excellent talk during the 1994 Hereford Ringing

"If you upset your learner by what you say, you defeat the whole purpose of the exercise. Boost morale, be constructive, give the right sort of criticism!"

There have of course also been some positive experiences, and obviously a friendly and supportive mood within the tower will do as much, if not more, to encourage ringing as the right method of teaching it. Are there many out there who agree with me?

I have asked, for self-evident reasons, for my name and address to be withheld.

# Ringing courses

One or two extremely liberal readers may allow, albeit grudgingly, "attenders" - but use of the non-word "attendees" is surely beyond any

reasonable limit?

## Omega doubles

I noticed on page 772 of Issue 4395 a list of new Doubles Variations. One of these, 180u/om, has been named Omega, this being Antelope using a Wallflower Bob and an Omega Single as

Immediately under the "new" variation is a note: 141f is Huntley with its own singles. Whilst I appreciate that Huntley with a Wallflower single is now called Huntley, as in the Central Council Doubles Collection of 1980, I am sure I am not alone, in the Doubles field, as having rung 141f and called it Omega for at least the last 25 years, long before the CC considered a Wallflower Single to be the call

I would ask Mr Jones, or the relevant CC Committee, to consider an alternative name for 180u/om to avoid any confusion with 141f now or in the future, the latter probably appearing in many peals and quarters as the original Omega.

# Horton in Ribblesdale ringers needed

In 1989 an appeal committee was formed with the responsibility to raise in excess of £68,000 for the restoration of St. Oswald's Church built 850 years ago.

This project entailed the replacement of the roof and the supporting timbers, major repairs to the tower, installing a new heating system

and repairs to the organ and bells.

I am glad to say the task is nearly completed. The only work left to be carried out is the reinstallation of the bells, which have been away for repairs. This is due to be done in August or early September. Although we only have three bells we are installing a bellframe for six so that if in some future time extra bells become available they can be accommodated with minimal expense.

The present bells are: a treble cast by George Dalton, York, approx. 6 cwt; second bell also cast by George Dalton of York in 1776, weight approx 8 cwt; third bell is the tenor bell by William Oldfield of York cast in 1614, weight approx. 10 cwt and sounds note G sharp.

We are now in the process of making the final arrangements for closing the appeal which are

1. Saturday October 21st: a Theme Night in Horton School which will take the form of a Disco and Fancy Dress Party with the theme Beaux and Belles (Bells). There will be a bar. Tickets will be available at the door. 8pm to midnight. To which all are welcome.

2. Shrove Tuesday, February 20th 1996: Closing of the Appeal with a Church Service. This will be seven years since the appeal was formed with a Pancake Party in the School and might be closed with a similar event.

As we need to train a team of bell ringers, will anyone interested in campanology please contact Mr. David Perry, Bridge House, Horton in Ribblesdale, Settle, N. Yorks BD24 0EY?

After so many people have put in to the appeal and all the hard work it is going to be a memorable occasion when we hear the church bells ring out again after being silent for so

#### Tower finances – the future

Much has been written in your excellent publication in recent times over tower finances and this has prompted me to share a few thoughts with you.

It costs an increasing amount of money to maintain our belfries in tip-top condition and as visitors, we are always pleased to ring in a new tower where the ringers obviously care about their hobby and keep their bells, fittings and surroundings to a high standard. Here in Jersey, we are no different. One of the traditional ways in which we have always raised funds is ringing for weddings - an average of ten or so a year in the 1980's meant that we did not have to worry about where money for the next rope was coming from. Alas, in the 1990's, the traditional British wedding seems to be going out of fashion and certainly in Jersey, much needed revenue from this source has all but dried up. Worse still is that there is no sign of a reverse in this disappointing trend. We therefore have to look elsewhere for our funds, as I know do a lot of mainland towers.

Earlier this year, we welcomed to Jersey a very nice band from the West Country. There were twelve ringers and they rang at St. Mark's for an hour, clearly enjoying the bells. They left

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a donation of £5.00. They then went on to our other island tower, St. John's, where they again rang for an hour. Here they left nothing for the tower. This equates to less than 42p per person for two hours of ringing. This is an insult. Secondly, we welcomed two groups of ringers to the island who were on an organised festival which had been arranged by a travel agent. This non-ringing agent had said nothing about tower fees and when asked politely if each ringer would like to make a £1.00 donation, I must say that most were quite happy to donate, but to those who obviously disapproved, I politely explained that although they may have believed that tower fees were included in their package fee, unfortunately they were not and having brought this to their attention, I felt they should be pleased to donate, after all, how many of us miss a pound these days?

It really is time that we moved into the 1990's as far as tower donations are concerned. We have a fabulous hobby and it doesn't cost the earth - we must all pull together and help each other to help ourselves. It is our regret that due to the attitude of a few - and I stress that it is a few - we have decided that we will make a minimum charge of £10.00 per tower for visiting bands to ring at both of Jersey's towers. In most cases, this will be less than £2.00 a head. As a benchmark, I believe that all ringers should be looking to donate at least £1.00 per head per tower when they are visiting churches. Even on the busy tower grab days when ten towers are rung, the cost per head would only equate to a good meal, a couple of average rounds down the boozer or a night at the local theatre. Towers should be encouraged to consider fixed fees for visiting bands, whether they be ringing peals, quarters or just general ringing. We've got to keep this great art going and although it gives me no pleasure to talk about money in this way, sometimes needs must.

# Striking on the Underground

Will Willans' letter (RW 4398 p.830) concerning a quarter peal at Margaretting reminded me of a peal which I and some friends rang on the Northern Line a few years back. The agreed footnote, if successful, was to be "first peal in the method by all, rung on the London Underground without bells". There was some discussion on the use of the word "rung" since it might be argued later that there had been no sound. However it was thought that if the ringers of the ten, eleven and twelve sounded "Bing Bang, Bong" at each course end then this would be sufficient.

The plan was that the twelve of us met at Morden Station for an 07.00 start to ring Northern Line Surprise Maximus No 2 (City Branch) between Morden and High Barnett and return. Soon after the start we settled into a steady rhythm with only minor variations in speed during the station stops although the conductor had commented on the shortness of the straps. One of the umpires had inadvertently got into the wrong carriage, but by the time he had made his way to the ringing carriage we were all in full swing. When we reached Kennington we were half way into the first quarter. Image our consternation when we found ourselves at Waterloo Station and on the Charing Cross Branch. The conductor rapidly re-arranged the composition and called usto be ready for the "Charing Cross Bob Single" which alters the method to Northern Line Surprise Maximus No 1 (CX Branch).

Thereafter the peal proceeded with a few lapses of concentration, particularly when passing through Euston where it is so easy to forget which line you are on, and also by the proximity of numerous visitors who were prone to ask questions during the peal. The peal came round on arrival at Clapham Common on the return journey in 3 hours and 15 minutes and we all congratulated ourselves in achieving the aim although we were somewhat disappointed when the conductor and umpires said they would not be sending the peal up to *The Ringing World* as the striking had not been good enough for a peal in a new method.

# Margaretting

I must commend Mr Willans (p.830) for adding an imaginative and much needed new piece of terminology to the ringing vocabulary. May I propose that the verb "to margaret", meaning to ring changes on a greater number of bells than the number physically in use, be adopted by the Exercise forthwith (notwithstanding any violent objections by ladies of that name, who may feel that the term reflects unfavourably on their attendance in the tower or implies doubts about their sanity).

It seems to me, though, that there are different categories of margaretting. Given a number of real bells, r, and a number of imaginary bells, i, these are:

simple margaretting (i=1),
compound margaretting (i>1),
complex margaretting (i>r) and
virtual margaretting (r=0).

Then there is a further classification into *manual*, *automatic* or *abstract* margaretting, depending on whether a missing bell is replaced by a gesticulating ringer, a computer or nothing at all. Indeed, we must allow the possibility of *hybrid* margaretting, where a mixture of substitutes may be used (e.g. an arm-waving treble ringer, a simulated working bell and an absent tenor cover).

Thus, the use of a single bell with a simulator to represent the rest of the band can now be defined as automatic-complex margaretting, while the practice of ringing "handbells" on thumbs becomes manual-virtual margaretting. However, the Central Council must be firm and declare abstract-virtual margaretting illegal, otherwise you, Sir, may be inundated with hoax peals claiming to be legitimate performances.

# A healthy local band required

I read Andrew Anderson's article (p. 833) with interest. While agreeing fully with all he says I am very worried by what he omits.

As he notes, a restored window, clock or weathercock should retain as much original material as possible. They will function quite adequately.

A restored bell installation should also function well. It should function as well as any modern installation unless it is being restored specially as a museum-piece. I couldn't help thinking of Staunton Harold in this respect.

I think most ringers would accept that bells are there to be rung regularly on Sundays. A healthy local band is the best way to achieve this. In general, a local band is most likely to thrive if the bells go well and are easily maintained

Anyone planning a restoration must ask themselves if they want an historic monument or

a viable going-concern on which the art of change ringing will prosper?

Mr Anderson only addresses the issue of "are the old fittings strong enough?" and thus I fear he is tending towards the former option. We all love to see ancient bell frames and enterprising ringers love to visit towers full of real "benders". They make a good challenge to a strong band of visitors, but hat chance a local band?

If the exercise is to prosper without losing its heritage of ancient technology, then the options which Mr Anderson bemoans at the start of his letter seem to be the best compromise. The old frames etc are preserved and the bells have their best chance of attracting a healthy local band for years to come.



# Taking the 'plain' out of Plain Bob Doubles

Quarter peals and Peals of Plain Bob Doubles do have the reputation for being boring for those more experienced ringers taking part. This is mostly due to the limited possibilities for calling extents of the method. I hope that the following will expand those callings thus adding some spice to the proceedings, especially for the conductor.

A couple of years ago the Revd John Morgan, then vicar of Mangotsfield, produced an article for this august journal on the subject of Bob Doubles. I believe that the article was never published, but a copy recently came into the hands of the present Tower Captain at Mangotsfield, Ryan Price who is also Branch Ringing Master, and he showed it to other members of the Branch. John's ideas seemed to us quite novel.

His approach was to produce a 'Bob Doubles Cube' with lead ends of Bob Doubles written




There are two rules for movement:


1. One place clockwise around a face represents a plain lead, e.g. from rounds 2345, a plain lead takes you to 3524, the next plain lead takes you to 5432 etc.

2. Stepping over the edge onto the next face represents a 'Bob" e.g. from rounds 2345 a bob lead takes you to 2354.

Every conceivable touch of Bob Doubles (true or false) can be seen as an excursion over the face of the cube so that, for example, an extent of 120 with 5th's observation can be shown as follows: (pppbpppbpppb).



Again, here is a 60: (bpbpbp).



If the cube is examined, it will be apparent that all changes occur twice, once at hand and once at back. The pairs occur on opposite faces of the cube, so tracing a path that involves opposite faces is probably - but not necessarily false.

John had tried to see if a 240 similar to Morris's 240 of Grandsire could be produced, i.e. all changes to occur twice, once at handstroke and once at backstroke.

In order to do this it is necessary to visit each edge (and thus each possible lead end) once, and once only. John had been able to show that this is not possible using 'bobs', and thus a 'Morris's' type 240 was unattainable

At the time that he wrote the article it appears that John did not consider the use of the 'single' in Bob Doubles. On his cube a 'single' takes one across to the far side of the cube, and so it opens up the possibility of many more paths and therefore many more touches, and even the 240.

Examination of the cube (combined with much head scratching) eventually came up with a calling to achieve this. It was:

pbpbpspspbps repeated. Investigation of this sequence shows that it works wherever in the sequence you start, thus giving 12 different callings, (e.g. spbpspbpsp repeated). It also works if called in reverse order (e.g. spbpspspbpbp), so there are a further 12 callings there. This means that there are 24 different 240's available. Pick any 21 of them and you have a peal composition which is far 'Plain', and should keep the average conductor wide awake! For a Quarter pick five of them and try a different 60 e.g. bppspp.

'Morgan's Cube" has shown itself to be a useful tool for visualising what happens during a touch of Bob Doubles, and it almost certainly can be used with many other doubles methods. The only criterion would appear to be that a bob calls are reversible, i.e. from whichever face you call the bob you arrive at the adjacent face. (This is not true of Reverse Canterbury for example).

# Desperately seeking JP II

The Swanmore (Hampshire) ringers would be grateful if the following appeal for the return of a rare and valued tower artefact could be made through your columns. The item in question was given to the tower by a pilgrim from Rome and is thought to be a unique example of the Pontiff's keen interest in, and understanding of, the art of change ringing. It takes the form of a beautifully crafted representation of His Holiness beneficently invoking ringers to pay attention to rhythm in the ringing of methods. The item, which has become something of an icon at Swanmore (where devotees have started their own society: the Rhythmicruxions), is about the size of an English postcard and was enshrined upon the tower wall by means of a specially adapted rope-clamp.

Imagine our distress upon finding this treasure to have disappeared. We suspect that our Pride-and-Joy may have inadvertently fallen into the possession of a band of ringers who visited us late on 15th July. We are certain that the icon was present before their arrival as the Keymaster General (second-in-command of the Rhythmicruxions) remembers offering the obligatory genufluxion before the shrine when opening the tower. Alas, about twelve hours later when we arrived to ring for Sunday service we found it had gone. Upon overcoming our distress we hypothesised that the severe vibration from our newly rehung 6cwt six might have caused the rope-clamp screws to loosen and the icon to fall, unobserved, into the unattended pocket of a concentrating ringer.

We would be much obliged, therefore, if our visitors could check to see whether the Swanmore Treasure' has secreted itself about their persons and, if so, to return it as soon as possible

THE SWANMORE RHYTHMICRUXIONS. .

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The first quarter on the new ten at Brecon Cathedral (Plain Bob Caters) was rung on Sunday 20th August.

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Alan Freke's 240s of Plain Bob Doubles are round blocks in which each of the different rows occurs the same number of times and, in accordance with Central Council Decision (D)B.1(b), may be used in a peal. To the best of my knowledge, his 240s have not been published previously and they certainly have not appeared in The Ringing World.

I confirm that it is not possible to produce a 240 of Plain Bob Doubles having each row once at hand stroke and once at back stroke using only standard bobs or only standard singles. Although an extent of Plain Bob Doubles using standard singles appeared (under another name) in Duckworth's Tintinnalogia in 1668, it was only in 1977 at Derby that the Council recognised the single as a standard call for the method. The standard calls for the 177 Doubles methods were given in Plain Doubles Methods and Variations published in 1980 and singles for Doubles methods have only been shown in The Ringing World Diary since 1992. This may explain why the Revd. John Morgan did not consider using singles.

Excluding rotations, there are 16 different 240s of Plain Bob Doubles having each row once at hand stroke and once at back stroke. When rotations are taken into account, there are 328 such 240s, compared with only 32 for Grandsire Doubles (Morris's, Price's and their rotations).

# George Massey's thousand peals – a very pedestrian effort!

It has taken George Massey 55 years 1½ months to ring 1,000 peals – is this a record for slowness? His first peal at Beddington on 6 April 1940 was of Cambridge Royal conducted by the late Charles Kippin, but, apart from several handbell peals of Bob Minor in 1941/42 called by Eddie Rapley, he rang no more peals until 1950. Thirty years service in the Royal Air Force also sometimes interfered with peal ringing opportunities, although it did provide a very productive period in Lincolnshire.

This is not to say that George has been idle during all those years. His career in the RAF was followed by a further career with the Inland Revenue. As a dedicated churchman, his 'spare time' has been spent in serving his Parish Church of St John's in various capacities apart from that of Tower Captain, serving on Synods and Diocesan Committees, including the Diocesan Advisory Committee as Bell and Clock Adviser. He has served the Bath & Wells as Peal Secretary, General Secretary and continues as Central Council Representative and the Frome Branch as Chairman and Deputy Chairman. George is well known for his work on the Central Council, serving on the Towers and Belfries for a number of years, he is currently Chairman of the redundant Bells Committee. Any other free times has been spent researching 'Church Bells of Somerset' which is nearing completion and helping his wife Hilda with her work at the town museum and other activities.

George's contribution to ringing in the Bath & Wells, where he continues to be the 'elder

statesman', cannot be over emphasised. In addition to his 'official' work, he has been responsible for encouraging large numbers of ringers towards peal ringing and along with his son, David, has seen many ringers through their first peal, helping them to develop both their ability and their repertoire. I, for one, am grateful to have fallen under their influence.

His thousand peals have involved 943 other ringers, 411 for only one peal each, in 345 towers for 34 societies (and regretfully one non-association peal!). Seven ringers have taken part in over a hundred of the peaks.

The following article appeared recently in *The New Zealand Herald* a morning paper published in Auckland:

#### Six-tonne Bell for War Memorial

One of the last four bells ordered to complete the War Memorial Carillon has rolled through the main entrance of the National War Memorial in Wellington.

The six-tonne, NZD175,000 Dutch made bronze bell, named Grace, will be dedicated officially by the Prime Minister, Mr Bolger, on Tuesday (15th August), the first of many events to mark the 50th anniversary of the end of the Second World War.

Three more bells, weighing 7, 8 and 12 tonnes will be installed later this year. The NZD1.2 million project will complete the set of 65 bells.

When finished the carillon will be the third largest in the world, both by number and weight of bells. Only the carillons of Riverside Church in New York and the Rockefeller Chapel in Chicago are larger.

From my own records, I would like to quote the following about this Carillon. It is quoted from a handbook about the Carillon.

The Carillon was dedicated on Anzac Day, 25th August 1932 and was supplied by Messrs Gillett and Johnston Ltd, of Croydon, England.

The first recital was given at the Croydon Bell Foundry on 10th April 1929, and, pending the erection of the National War Memorial Tower in Wellington to house the bells, the carillon was loaned to the Newcastle-on-Tyne Exhibition, and to the authorities of Hyde Park, London, where in 1929 and 1930 respectively, it delighted hundreds of thousands of listeners and became the most famous and popular carillon in the British Isles.

# Lies, Damn Lies and Statistics ...

On page 718 of the Ringing World, it was reported that the Peal Compositions Committee attracted a degree of flak at the Central Council meeting in Salisbury for alleged inactivity. The Chair (a mild-mannered piece of furniture which always shrinks from controversy) was caught on the hop and graciously ate humble pie before its critics.

Meanwhile, over at the Foundation for the Replacement of Sticks by Carrots, the alarm bells rang and we set our researchers to work compiling hard statistics to support or refute the criticisms. The initial source of our data was Tony Smith's admirable An Index to Compositions in the Ringing World (1941-1992), updated for the years 1992–95 by the Foundation's own researchers. The results of our work are summarised in the histogram.

Each black bar represents the number of compositions (over 5,000 changes) published in the Ringing World in each Council year (actually from page 501 to page 500 of the following year). This data revealed startlingly uneven publication rates for all Committees over the 19-year period examined, so we tried to smooth out transitory effects (membership change, publication latency) by showing (as grey bars) a rolling 3-year average of the number published (i.e. each grey bar is the average of the current and previous two black bars). As expected, the variation was reduced, but a 6-year cycle in peal numbers remained clearly visible. Finally, the horizontal dashed line represents the all-time average number published (since 1941). This has remained remarkably constant at 83 for each year of the period examined, and is probably the best yardstick to judge a Committee's performance in any individual year.

Whilst the Foundation has no theory to explain the 6-year cycle, it cannot interpret the present Committee's performance as anything other than supremely average. Naturally we do not subscribe to Disraeli's view of statistics, and are quite convinced that some people at the Council meeting simply got their Fax wrong.


#### Loose talk

I think Frank Lufkin mistaken (RW 25th August, p.900) when he says there are only 5040 changes of triples. I have never found more than 20, (4 triple changes, 10 double changes and 6 single changes). Grandsire only makes use of 4 of them (IXXX, XXXI, XIXX and IIIXX) but there are many compositions that allow all 5040 possible rows to be obtained using these 4 changes.

Of course, as a man of the world. I am aware that people loosely talk about changes when they mean rows. It does not harm, but loose talk should not be mixed with fine arguments.

I hope Frank is not right and I wrong. If he were I would have to amend my peal records all of which currently (and perhaps misguidedly) show lengths of over 5000 odd. If Frank's logic is correct, my peals of minor should each be replaced by 7 consecutive peals of 720 each, while each doubles peal would become a staggering 42 consecutive peals of 120 each. I have never been an avid peal ringer, but this would add over 350 to my otherwise very modest total.

The belated appearance of this peal (extracted from the fabled "Composition Black Hole" in apparent violation of the laws of physics; sorry Glenn) doubles the number of tenors-together compositions in these methods (the other is Graham John's 1985 peal (RW page 424). But how much can rarity value compensate for a twofold excess of Rutland over Belfast? And is 75 combination rollups more or less than we should expect by chance? On the positive side, we have more than double the Bristol content of Graham's peal with only small reduction in Glasgow and no singles either. All in all, Glenn has contributed another worthwhile and challenging addition to the spliced repertoire.

Notable landmarks reached during the week included George Massey's 1,000 Peal (600th for the B & W) and Donald Carter's 1,000th of Surprise. Others included 25th and 75th for the B & W (and Donald Carter's 100th for the B & W on Peal Week), 25th, 50th and 100th together and 25th and 75th together on Peal Week. George Massey recorded his 550th of Major and Donald Carter his 50th of 8-Spliced Surprise Major and 50th of Surprise Major as conductor.

# Obituary

## Leslie D. Mills – Bures, Suffolk

One of the most 'colourful' characters for many a long year in the Suffolk Guild, Les Mills passed away peacefully at the beginning of

August.

Bom in Long Melford in 1908 he moved to Bures in 1938 and became one of the best known ringers along the Stour Valley. Whatever he undertook he did it thoroughly and well. Indeed one local worthy, having spent a holiday in the Romsey area and sampling the local waters - Strongs, pronounced on his return to his native part of Suffolk that he was now in "the Mills Country" recalling the brewer's famous

In 1950 Leslie restored and augmented the heavy six at Bures, taught scores of ringers including his wife Emily - a blessed memory; his son Donald, John Loveless, Janet Spurgeon and a host of others. And he taught them well. It was a great time for him too, to see his

grandchildren ring.

The redundant eight at Sudbury St Peter came under Les' influence and he was instrumental in augmenting them to ten. He held District office and was made a Vice-President of the Guild.

He was a fine craftsman too, in wood, and no mean engineer; much in demand in the area on a

host of projects.

Above all Leslie Mills was a family man. Sadly in the last few years he became very ill and one missed his energy and certainly his firm opinions!

Our sympathy goes out to Don and Jenny, the grandchildren and to all those ringers he taught over the years. But Bures will always be Mills Country. Leslie – Rest in Peace. G.W.P.

# Harry Bishop B.E.M.

(1921-1995)

Harry was the type of ringer who is the backbone of any band. He could be relied upon to be there for all Sunday and practice night ringing over the forty plus years that he was able to ring at Banbury.

Harry was born at Grimsbury in Banbury but at an early age moved, with his parents, to Horley a small village about three miles north of Banbury. Here he sang in the choir and at about the age of 11, with his brother Jack, he learnt to

ring on the four bells.

In 1940 Harry joined the RAF and was sent to Crete where he was captured. From here, with his fellow prisoners, he was marched to Germany where he saw out the rest of the war in prisoner of war camps. Just after the end of the war he married Phyllis his wife whom he met whilst on holiday at Butlins.

It was also just after the war, about 1948, that Harry joined the band at Banbury. During many of his ringing years he held jointly with his brother Jack the post of Steeple Keeper, and much is owed to them for all the hard work they put in to keep Banbury bells going so well. Although Harry rang some methods he much preferred to ring the tenor behind. It was in this role that he rang several peals over the years. During the last few years when illness prevented him from ringing the one thing that he missed most was being able to ring at Christmas.

Harry was also a keen scouter and as a youngster he became a King's Scout. He continued to be associated with scouting for many years. In 1982 he was awarded the British Empire Medal for his work as a plumber with the old Banbury Water Company and later Thames Water. An award of which he was justly

Harry also belonged to the Banbury branch of the Royal Airforce Association and served as its club president, a position which gave him great pleasure. Sadly Harry died in Katherine House Hospice on Thursday July 27th. At his funeral all ten bells were rung half muffled before and after the service and in the evening a half muffled quarter was rung in his memory B. J. DAVIS

#### Jack L. Lucas

It was with great sadness that I learnt of the death of my old friend Jack Lucas. Jack (whose real names Ronald Herbert were never used) was one of the first ringers with whom I became friendly when I began to attend Guild meetings. It was his sense of humour and friendly nature which did much to put us teenagers at our ease, encouraging us to persevere in a bellringing society that was much more serious in the 1950's than it is nowadays.

Jack learnt to ring at Holt (Wiltshire) in 1929 and was a keen member of the local band until the War broke out. During the War he had the misfortune to be taken prisoner. A request for a bellringing book during his confinement was almost instrumental in his being shot as a spy, his captors taking much persuading that books containing long columns of numbers were not some form of secret code book.

When the war ended Jack again took up ringing at Holt, eventually becoming tower captain, only leaving when he married and moved to Trowbridge in 1951. He joined the Trowbridge band in that year, serving the tower loyally until his illness forced him into retirement 40 years later. For most of that period he was the steeple keeper at St James.

After his marriage Jack did not give up all ties with Holt. For some years he kept an allotment garden down by Holt railway. This was at a time when we were doing a great deal of ringing, especially of quarter peals at the tower. I can well remember several occasions cycling down to persuade him to make up a band as we had met one short. He never refused us, even if it was just to tenor behind to some multi-doubles, this was typical of his kind

It was not only to the Trowbridge tower that Jack's ringing was confined, he was a staunch supporter of the Guild and hardly ever missed a branch meeting, often cycling to them in the early years. Later his children Philip and Gillian and eventually his wife Eileen learnt to ring. They were soon to be found in all corners of the Branch, supporting Guild functions and assisting many struggling bands. In 1985 the Devizes branch inaugerated an award for services to the Branch above and beyond the call of duty, named after the late President and Branch member Charles Andrews. It was only fitting that Jack and his family should be among the first to be presented with the award. Jack's service to the Guild and Branch also earned him a well-deserved Honorary Life Membership to the Guild.

Those of us who knew Jack will always remember him with great affection. We hope also that our support of his family at this sad time will go some way to repaying the debt of BOB PURNELL kindness that we owe him.

#### Marco Tosin

1964-1995

We met Marco in 1985 on the occasion of the first visit to Malvern by Italian ringers from Vicenza. He was an artist and a musician, and his inexhaustible enthusiasm and passion for bells and ringing earned him the nick-name of "Mad Marco" amongst his English friends. He had the gift of perfect pitch and was able to identify as many as 10 different tones in a bell. He was fascinated by English-tuned bells and on his return to Italy tried tuning bells himself. He achieved considerable success and before long was able to help and advise the bell foundries as well as local churches

Some of the Vicenza ringers had organised a trip to Dijon to to attend a carillon festival. Marco had wanted to join the group but, as there were not enough places, he decided instead to go with a friend to the bell foundry at Agnone. He was delighted to acquire a small bell and phoned home to say they would be travelling back overnight to avoid the traffic. In the early hours of 3rd August Marco was killed in an accident on the autostrada near Mantua.

After the funeral the bells of Vicenza rang out to celebrate Marco's love of life. A few days later I was privileged to be invited to join in the ringing for morning Mass at the tiny village of Gambugliano about eight miles North West of Vicenza. Here, to, Marco was remembered as he had helped with the recent augmentation of the bells. These, like many others in the area, are "Marco's bells", well-tuned and a lasting memorial to an exceptional talent. We have lost a dear friend but for ringing in Italy the loss will be great indeed.

Maureen is a Dorset C.A. representative on the Central Council and is currently Public Relations Officer for the Association. We welcome her to her new post and look forward to working with her.

No doubt many readers will have noted price rises introduced by national newspapers\* in the last few weeks. Although we are reputedly in a period of low inflation the cost of paper has been soaring and we are faced with a 7% increase in the cost of printing *The Ringing World*. However the Board decided not to increase the price of *The Ringing World* for the time being. The situation will be reviewed at the next Board Meeting (the November one) when the budget for 1996 is drawn up.

Bill was a Life Member of the Central Council, Master Emeritus of the Worcestershire and Districts Association and had served for many years as legal adviser both to the Council and *The Ringing World*. The funeral service was held at Selly Oak on Wednesday 6th September.

We are also very sad to hear of the sudden death of Mr. Eric E. Speake of Dudley. We understand that Mr. Speake collapsed and died while on a ringing tour of Canada.

We note that congratulations are due to Andrew M. Farmer who completed his 1000th peal on August 27th. The peal was rung at Alwalton, Cambs and was Doubles (15m) conducted by Andrew.

We were sorry to hear that Norman Summerhayes suffered a heart attack whilst in Norwich. Our best wishes to him for a speedy recovery.

Melbourne, Derbyshire bells are now back in the tower, including the two new memorial bells, and the work is on schedule for the dedication on 24th September by the Bishop of Repton. This takes place at the Parish Communion at 10 a.m. and a warm invitation is extended to everyone. At the service there will also be a thanksgiving for the work that has been done in the church during the last two years in the three phases of work completed so far.

However, a hold-up outside our control will prevent the bells from being rung at the dedication. Whilst all will be complete in the belfry, our unusual arrangement of rope-guides will not. We had to await final approval of the designs by English Heritage before we could go ahead with preparing new guides, and this has come too late for them to be made in time by our local blacksmith. As it would be most unwise to attempt to ring Melbourne bells without rope-guides, we shall have to be content with chiming the new bells at the dedication. An open ringing session will be advertised in the near future, and all will be FREDERICK ROSS. welcome.

I saw a photo and article in the West Australian of 2nd September describing a 12,500 kg bell made in Asten, Holland - a gift from Queen Elizabeth to the people of New Zealand. Although I do not know the circumstances surrounding this Dutch-made British gift, I ask whether our efforts at public relations are sufficient. We have at least one Central Council publication which emphasises the need for P.R. and that all guilds and associations should practise it, but exactly who is responsible for lobbying the Queen's advisers, Government and the media at a national level? Could there be a joint venture between The Ringing World, bellfounders and Central Council? Perhaps once or twice a year Ringing Digest could be circulated with suitable stories and commercials drawn mainly from 51 editions of The Ringing World emphasising all the positives and export DAVID KNEWSTUB potential?

Funny lot, ringers! Why do they choose the hottest weather to ring heavy bells to peals? We've recently reported single-handed performances on the tenors of St. Paul's Cathedral and Exeter Cathedral and a peal of Maximus at Liverpool Cathedral. We now hear that a peal of Surprise Minor (7 methods) was rung at Queen Camel on August 5th with Adrian Beck on the 37 cwt tenor.

According to the *Dorset Evening Echo*, St. Peter's, Dorchester is to hold an Open Day in September when visitors will be able to watch the ringers in action ... "Said ringers' Captain Graham Colborne: The idea is to generate some interest and show the community what we do."

The following is a true story, where the Vicar in question had better remain anonymous, for his future credibility. A band of ringers met at his Church to ring for Evensong, to be greeted by the Vicar with a request not to ring, because an environmental health officer would be visiting his house to investigate a complaint he had made about noise from a record player, from a neighbouring house! He would not even allow ringing for a reduced period. This is an extreme example of an incumbent showing a lack of appreciation of bells, and the efforts of his ringers; but there is no doubt that the theological colleges could do more to instruct non-ringing ordinands about the role of bells in Church life.
